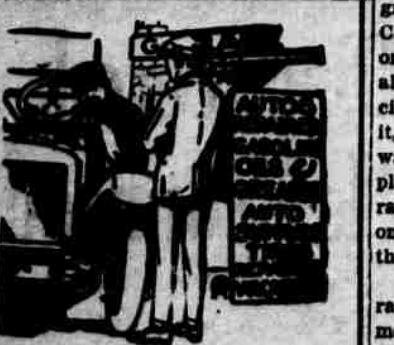

OUR RAILROAD?

A COUNTRY that holds several won-
ders that equal anything in the
world, that have been attested to as
comparing favorably with anything in
Europe time and time again; which
the head of the greatest national edu-
cational magazine in the world praises
beyond anything else in the state—we
might expect to receive some advertis-
ing, passenger rates, and some slight
attention as to its possibilities from the
only railroad within this section. But
not so with Klamath Falls or Klamath
county.

Our only railroad (?) has failed
utterly, and though they have no com-
petition, it might have been hoped that
they would have sought to use this por-
tion of the country to increase their
travel, but not so.

Frequent reports coming from San
Francisco and the fair, showing that
this section of the country has received
little or no advertising amongst the
thousands of visitors and tourists to
the fair and the Pacific Coast. Last
night several passengers came in on
the evening extra, headed for Crater
Lake.

They stated that it was only an ac-
cident. They had inquired at the of-
fices in California, about Oregon, and
the information tendered them in re-
gard to Crater Lake was nothing.
Friends of theirs in Berkeley told
them this was the greatest sight on
the Pacific Coast, and that they should
not miss it, by any means. They were
then headed to visit the lake by way of
Medford, necessitating a trip of over
100 miles out of the way. Further in-
quiry was made at the railroad offices,
but nothing was found out. By their
own diligence and the energy of their
friends they finally figured out where
by they might make the trip and get
the railroad company to honor their
tickets at Medford again. It was final-
ly accomplished.

The visit of the district passenger
and freight agent here yesterday was
pretty much of an apology for the rail-
road company. He took credit for the
placing of the sleeper on the daily
train, after six months of kicking and
correspondence that would fill a Con-
gressional record by the Commercial
Club and others. The sleeper is now
on after the season is nearly over. He
almost promised another train for this
city, and stated that he is working on
it, stating that competition was not
wanted here, and that they wanted to
please the people. The company would
rather please the people and keep the
one road than see another road
through here. Very logical.

The railroad service here is out-
rageous, and would not be tolerated in
most sections, except that we have
been treated to it for so long that we
are almost used to it—but not yet.
There will come a time when things
will be different, and the people of
Klamath Falls will be catered to, rat-
her than catered against.

NEEDED FIRE APPARATUS

IT IS VERY evident that Klamath
Falls' fire protection at this time is
at a minimum, especially in certain
sections of the city, where hydrants
are scarce and where the water pres-
sure is poor. The city can consider
itself lucky for the past few months,
and years, perhaps, that more disas-
trous fires have not started that would
have wiped out whole sections of the
city.

The city department at present con-
sists of five hose carts stationed about
the city, a roll of hose on the hill, and
a worthless ladder truck. The haul-
ing of the carts to fires is left to auto-
mobile owners, who usually respond
with alacrity, but not always. During
the night a fire starts, and before the
department is able to respond the fire
is able to gain such a headway that
much loss is encountered, if not a total
loss, such as the Orpheus fire.

The only means by which a fire can
be reported from districts outlying is
by telephone, and it is probable that
few people know the fire ward they

reside in. If the ward is given, some
difficulty might be found in locating a
fire, due to the large area covered by
the wards.

A fire alarm system was installed by
the council once, but was removed as
inefficient, and since then the matter
seems to have been dropped to a great
extent. It was suggested that a notice
be placed in well known fire journals
that Klamath Falls is in the market
for a fire truck of some nature, but
this seems also to have gone by the
boards without notice.

In the purchase of a fire truck the
city authorities should take extreme
care. We have a wide expanse of ter-
ritory to cover, and a large chemical
should be provided—a machine that
will travel, and at the same time will
be capable of use on the hills and in
the snow and mud of winter. Many
fire trucks are entirely too heavy for
this city, for as soon as they run off
the pavement in the winter time they
would be of little use. But it is evi-
dent that a truck of some kind, prop-
erly fitted and equipped for fighting
fires, is an urgent need of this city.

WAR DEPARTMENT ASKS EXPLANATION

GENERAL WOOD TO BE ASKED TO
EXPLAIN INVITATION TO SPEAK
AFTER HE HAS SCORED THE AD-
MINISTRATION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 27.—
It was learned today that the war de-
partment will probably ask General
Wood to explain why he invited ex-
President Roosevelt to visit and speak
at the Plattsburg training camp for
business men, when his attitude on
the administration's policy is so well
known.

He delivered the address Wednesday
night, and it is considered to have
practically condemned the adminis-
tration's foreign policy. Secretary of
War Garrison states that he is not pre-
pared to discuss the charge yet.
