- Premier Asquith reports heavy losses by British in operations along Belgian border.
- Sinking of two German cruisers and two torpedo boats reported by British.
- German scouting parties seen as far as Arras and Calais.
- Russians continue to advance in East Prussia.
- Austrian defenses of Lemberg are driven back to fortifications by the Russians.
- Louvain completely destroyed by Germans as reprisal for alleged hostile acts.
- German torpedo boat S-90 sunk off Chefou by British torpedo boat Weland.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Conditions reports have obscured the recent naval battle of the Gulf of Riga, but there seems no room for doubt that the engagement occurred, and that the Germans were driven off. The German losses cannot be determined by the vaguely worded report from the Russian admiralty that two cruisers and eight torpedo boats were "destroyed or damaged."

Whether any were actually destroyed must be known to the Russians. It is highly improbable that the Germans could be forced to retreat by the Slavs alone. They must have had assistance, which was a surprise to the Germans.

The nature of this assistance is suggested in the Russian report that a British submarine torpedoed a German dreadnaught. If a number of British submarines had got into the Baltic and had lain in wait for the Germans, the German defeat would be adequately explained. It is most probable that this is what actually happened. There have been many indications recently that English submarines are in the "German lake."

The German Baltic fleet hereafter will have to adopt more cautious measures, if it is not to be destroyed by British submarines.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—That alarm is felt among financial interests of the belligerents over the destruction of wealth by the war is evident. However, reports of secret meetings in Berlin and Petrograd in which possible bankruptcy by Germany and Russia was admitted, must be accepted with reserve.

The financiers do not fear bankruptcy, but rather impoverishment after peace has been declared. Russia cannot go into bankruptcy, if for no other reason than that she is being underwritten by France and England. There is no danger of Germany going into bankruptcy while she has the state railways to mortgage. Nations seldom allow the danger of bankruptcy to stand in the way of prosecution of war; it is not probable that the fear of insolvency is causing uneasiness at any of the capitals.

The belligerents scarcely have begun to pay for the war. Almost the whole of the \$75,000,000 a day which the German minister of finance estimates the war is costing, has been raised by loans. Hardly any war taxation has been imposed in Europe. Germany has announced that she will fight to the end of the war on loans. The English cabinet is reluctant to act in this matter, despite the fact that it has been urged to levy heavy taxes. If the war lasts much longer the chief result will be a pile of debts which will require doubling of present taxes to meet the interest and establish a sinking fund. Then the abject poverty which the war is preparing will be felt, and especial economic revolutions will become possible.

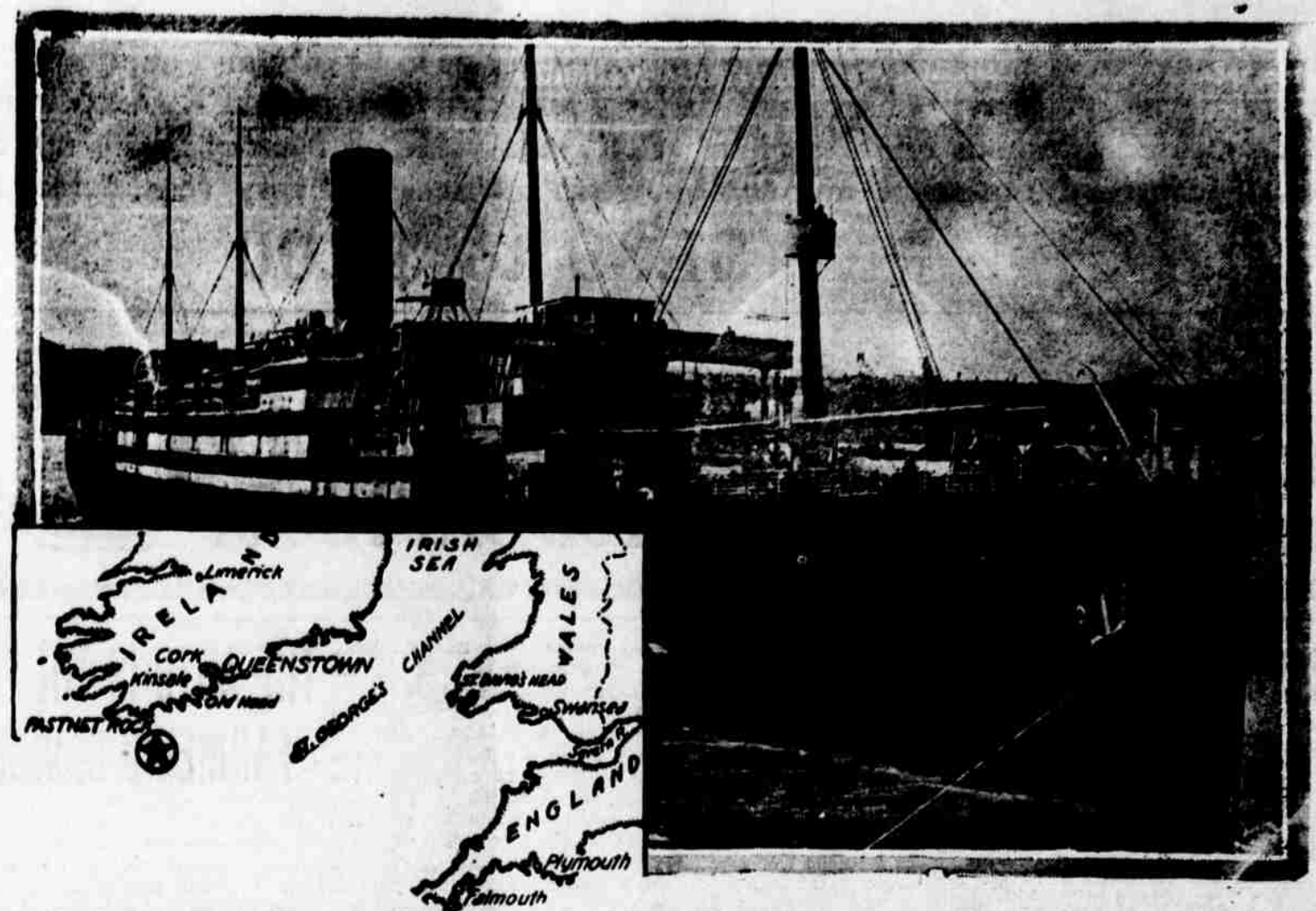
Possibly the leaders are taking steps toward calling attention to the need of lessening this distress, rather than guarding against bankruptcy.

An Ordinance Providing for the Construction of Sidewalks on a Portion of Esplanade Street, in Second Hot Springs Addition.

THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1.—That it is expedient and necessary that sidewalks be constructed on the northerly side of Esplanade street and fronting the following described property: Lot 18 of block 61; right of way of Southern Pacific company; right of way of United States of America (used for irrigation canal), and the piece or parcel described by metes and bounds as: beginning at a point on the northwesterly side of Esplanade street, where the same intersects the right of way of the United States government canal on southerly side; thence in a southerly direction following the northwesterly line of Esplanade street 168.2 feet to right of way of Southern Pacific company; thence in a northwesterly direction along said right of way of Southern Pacific company 480.4 feet to the intersection of the rights of way of said Southern Pacific company and United States government canal; thence in a southeasterly direction to place of beginning, the said parcel being designated as lot D; all of said property above described being situate in Second Hot Springs Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Section 2.—That the Common Council hereby declares its intention to construct said sidewalks, and directs the Police Judge to give notice thereof, and that the City Engineer post notices, as by Charter provided; that the plans, specifications of the City Engineer on file with the Police Judge are hereby approved and adopted. That the estimated cost of the construction of said sidewalks as given by the City Engineer is the sum of \$80.00.

Section 3.—That September 15, 1915, is hereby fixed as the date for hearing objections or remonstrances against said proposed improvement.

Section 4.—That the property hereinbefore described be assessed for the cost of said sidewalks.

Section 5.—That the City of Klamath Falls hereby elects to construct said sidewalks, to employ the labor and to purchase and furnish the material necessary therefor.
