THE COW AND PROSPERITY

"As soon as the people of Oregon see that the greatest asset they have is the cow, then there will not be the slightest possibility that a financial depression will ever occur in your state."

STATE SENATOR SULLIVAN of Stillwater, Minn., made the above statement in Portland a few days ago, and he gave good advice. No doubt he speaks from a ripe experience, because Minnesota has made as great strides towards prosperity the last fifteen or twenty years as any state in the Union.

If anybody had said a quarter of a century ago that Minnesota would ever be one of the best dairy sections of this country, the statement would have been met with derision. Dairying being one of the chief industries there now, Senator Sullivan found reason to say, "We hear absolutely nothing of hard times in Minnesota."

Minnesota marches swiftly along in prosperity, and one of the reasons apparently is that the agricultural sections are much given over to the dairy cow, which, of course, means that the swine industry is a leading one. One never sees a dairy section without a large number of hogs, the hog and the cow going "hand in hand," so to speak.

Compare Minnesota with Oregon! Think what the Minnesotans have done in their rigorous climate, where dairy cows have not so much as six months in open pasture in the year. Then take Oregon, with the year-round pasture in the favored sections, with a mild climate and with a wealth of the best of green food all the time. There is no comparison that can be made that does not show Oregon to have the advantage. The statements of Senator Sullivan only bear out what the Oregonian and other newspapers of the state for some time have been teaching what the officials of the Oregon Agricultural College have been hammering away at for two decades—that the dairy cow will not only help to lead us to prosperity, but help to keep us there—Portland Oregonian.

Alabama Mines Much Coal

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 28.—The coal mining industry in Alabama has been developed to a 22,000,000 ton capacity, says C. H. Nesbit, chief mine inspector, in his annual report. The net tonnage this year shows an increase of nearly 4,500,000 tons over the 1914 output, which was about 3,000,000 tons below normal for the 363 mines in the state.

BEND SAWMILL HAS BIG FIRE

FIVE MILLION FEET OF LUMBER DESTROYED IN YARD ESTIMATED AT \$75,000—NOT AFFECT CONSTRUCTION OF NEW MILL

BEND, Aug. 28.—A fire which started from sparks blown from a burning waste pile, completely destroyed the lumber yard of the Bend company on Wednesday afternoon, destroying approximately 5,000,000 feet of rough and finished lumber.

The loss is estimated at \$75,000, on which there was \$37,000 insurance. The fire was discovered in one pile in the eastern portion of the yard when the alarm was sounded. The flames were confined to one small pile, but were suddenly fanned by a high east wind, which took the blaze down the narrow alleys, and before the small equipment on hand could be assembled the flames were beyond control.

The fire swept with great rapidity over the finished lumber, and with a change in the high wind, almost every part of the yard was quickly covered by the flames. More than 600 men fought the fire without being able to get it under control at any time. In
