**EVENTS IN THE WAR ONE YEAR AGO TODAY**

Four French army corps repulse German force at Guise in North Arden, France.  
German troops are reported passing through Belgium, going east to reinforce resistance to Russian advance.  
Five Russian army corps reported repulsed by Germans south of Allenstein.  
Austrians reported driving Russians out of Galicia.  
Russian reports contradict German and Austrian announcements of success, fall of Allenstein to the Russians being reported, on the contrary, and repulse of Austrian advance.  
Two hundred German prisoners taken in naval battle in Bight of Holland, reach London. Populace rejoices. First naval fight of the war.  
German Officers hurrying to Turkey, and declaration of war by Turkey is expected.

**LEWIS TAKES A QUICK ACTION**

**THOUGH CONTRARY TO AGREEMENT TO INSTIGATE A FRIENDLY SUIT, CHIEF DEPUTY CANTINE IS DISMISSED**

SALEM, Aug. 28.—Completely violating an agreement entered into with the state highway commission for the institution of a friendly suit to determine whether he or his chief deputy, E. I. Cantine, should be state highway engineer, State Engineer Lewis has dismissed Cantine from his position. The reason given for the dismissal was that Cantine, at a recent meeting of the commission, had elected to follow its instructions instead of those of Lewis, and the object apparently was to put the blame and burden on the commission to institute the suit to determine this controversy.

Both Governor Withycombe and State Treasurer Kay expressed astonishment at Lewis' breach of his agreement, and declared that they would sustain Cantine, and that it would now devolve upon Lewis to execute his order dismissing him.

Although the administration of R. E. Clanton, as superintendent of hatcheries was severely assailed by Commissioner Warren at a meeting of the fish and game commissioner here recently, he emerged from it triumphant, and will continue in office. Governor Withycombe and Commissioners Stone and Jacks are said to have favored his retention, and Commissioners Warren and Fleischner his removal.

**MINER'S STORY RIVALS OLD MYTH**

**ONCE RICH AND AND HAPPY, IS ATTACKED BY PARALYSIS, DEBILITATED BY WIFE AND FAMILY, AND THEN DECLARED INSANE**

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—Rivaling an intrigue from the old "Family Magazine" story, is the experience of E. M. Walters, former wealthy mining man, whose attempt to recover his lost fortune came up in Judge Van Nostrand's court today.

Made speechless from a stroke of paralysis, which also robbed him of the use of his hands, for five years Walters had to watch, helpless and unresisting, the desertion of his wife, the alienation of his son's affections and the loss of \$50,000 worth of mining property.

Forced by his infirmity into inaction, Walters has had to sit through investigations into his sanity, commitments to asylums, and listen to what he declares to be the perjured evidence of private doctors, unable to reemstate or protest.

Walters is a practical mining man. In the Nome gold rush he made fortunes on the beach—and lost them. Walters recovered the use of his voice sufficiently in 1914 to tell his difficulties to his brother and an attorney. In the meantime his wife had obtained a decree of divorce and married J. E. Neuman, a taxicab owner. Walters charges his former wife and Neuman with collusion to "railroad" him to the asylum.

**An Ordinance Providing for the Construction of Sidewalks on a Portion of Esplanade Street, in Second Hot Springs Addition.**

**THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:**  
Section 1—That it is expedient and necessary that sidewalks be constructed on the northerly side of Esplanade street and fronting the following described property: Lot 18 of block 61; right of way of Southern Pacific company; right of way of United States of America (used for irrigation canal), and the piece or parcel described by metes and bounds as: beginning at a point on the northwesterly side of Esplanade street, where the same intersects the right of way of the United States government canal on southerly side; thence in a southerly direction following the northwesterly line of Esplanade street 169.3 feet to right of way of Southern Pacific company; thence in a northwesterly direction along said right of way of Southern Pacific company 480.4 feet to the intersection of the rights of way of said Southern Pacific company and United States government canal; thence in a southeasterly direction to place of beginning, the said parcel being designated as lot D; all of said property above described being situate in Second Hot Springs Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Section 2—That the Common Council hereby declares its intention to construct said sidewalks, and directs the Police Judge to give notice thereof, and that the City Engineer post notices, as by Charter provided; that the plans, specifications of the City Engineer on file with the Police Judge are hereby approved and adopted. That the estimated cost of the construction of said sidewalks as given by the City Engineer is the sum of \$80.00.

Section 3—That September 15, 1915, is hereby fixed as the date for hearing objections or remonstrances against said proposed improvement.

Section 4—That the property hereinbefore described be assessed for the cost of said sidewalks.

Section 5—That the City of Klamath Falls hereby elects to construct said sidewalks, to employ the labor and to purchase and furnish the material necessary therefor.
