OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"Thy Will"

By Rev. E. C. Richards, Pastor Grace M. E. Church

"Teach me to do thy will; for thou art my God—thy spirit is good; lead me into the hand of uprightness."

This utterance has the ring of sincerity. Men may pray for blessings and not be sincere. They may pray for the good things of the earth and never believe that they will receive them, or care to offer themselves in return. They may do the same in regard to spiritual blessings of peace. Men may pray for power or for place, or the renewal of friendship, or for love or for blessings upon others, and yet not be sincere. They may even pray to know God's will and yet not be sincere. But men do not pray God to teach them TO DO God's will unless they are sincere. So this text.

David was a many sided character, but he was consistent in one thing—that he always repented and tried to get on his feet again. God loves men. He does not love them for their weakness and he does not love them more than strong men, but he loves them as men. He holds out to them remedies for weakness. No man has become fully sincere as a Christian until he can pray this prayer: "To appreciate beauty; to love transparency; to seek culture; to pray for freedom from habit; to avoid sin; all these are good and God-like." But they are so only to a degree. Shining far above them and reaching out far beyond them into the future of progress stands the soul of the man who prays this prayer: "Teach me to do thy will."

Jesus Christ was more than a theory or a principle. He was a God dwelling in the flesh. Jesus' life was more than platitudes of sighing, or bemoaning the sins of men. Sometimes he wept and sometimes he cried out in agony because men were so bad. But, he was a doer. His greatest doing was his death. It was the culmination of doing. It was the bursting out of a great faith that had in it unbounded love for those who have not learned to do and for those who have not cared to learned to do. Most of the gods of the races have been gods of action, but the God of David inspires men to seek his will for the love of right. The will of this God begets trembling only when men sin. No man who prays this prayer has any need to tremble in abject fear. His soul ought to be filled with a mighty peace. Why? "For thou art my God—thy spirit is good."
