COST OF NATIONAL DEFENSE

SOME statistics not always emphasized in the statements of the National Security League are called to attention by the New York World. The National Security League shows that it has cost the United States a billion dollars in ten years to maintain an army of 90,000, while for \$65,000,000 Switzerland has had for ten years a citizen army of 500,000, always ready if needed.

More startling still are the facts, if we total our military bills for army, navy and pensions. When the European war broke out they were nearly \$487,000,000 a year, not including some \$10,000,000 paid by states for militia. Great Britain in 1914 was spending \$370,000,000 for army, navy and pensions, Russia, \$407,000,000 for army and navy, and Germany \$300,000,000 for army and \$114,000,000 for navy.

Our 1913-1914 army cost of \$173,000,000 equalled that of Germany before the imperial army act of 1913, in preparation for the present war. Our naval cost of nearly \$140,000,000 was second only to Great Britain's.

Ex-President Taft computes that our active army costs \$1,200 for each man. The league figures a ten year total cost of \$10,000 a man.

From these figures the conclusion can be drawn that for years the United States has been getting the least for its money of any other nation.

If we are to be placed in a condition of greater preparedness it is evident different methods should be adopted.—Portland Journal.

MANY EXISTENCES TO MYSTERY MAN

DISAPPEARS MANY TIMES, BUT LATER SHOWS UP AS ANOTHER. IDENTIFICATIONS COMPARED PROVE MANY DIFFERENT LIVES

SAN JOSE, Aug. 20.—The theory that Harry Walker, "the man without a memory," supposed to have been Prof. William Lavelle of Toronto, is a man who has lived separate existences throughout the United States, was advanced today as the result of another positive identification of the man.

Today "Walker" was positively identified as Max Freedman, brother of Richard Freedman of Boston, who disappeared in 1904. After commencing his education over again here, "Walker" suffered another relapse and disappeared from the county hospital.

It has been established that "Walker" is Harry Williams, who wandered away from San Diego several years ago. Evidence as to his identity indicates that Williams and Freedman are the same man.

DISGRACED MAN DIES A HERO

DESERTER FROM LONELY POST IN INDIA, RE-ENLISTS UNDER AN ASSUMED NAME, DIES AT FRONT IN GREAT CHARGE

LONDON, Aug. 20.—For years a deserter in hiding, despised by his friends and his country, "Private Thomas Hardy" died a hero's death in the front ranks at Festubert.

The war office has removed the stigma that attached to his name, and has put that name on the roll of honor. The official bulletin a few days ago hinted at the circumstances, but the real story developed today.

Captain H. S. M. Smart, Fifty-third Sikhs, Khyber Rifles, tired of duty at a lone frontier post in India, deserted. He escaped arrest, wandered through Europe, and finally reached England in civilian clothes. Only his mother and brother knew his whereabouts.

Smart brooded over the disgrace he had caused his family. Shortly after the war broke out he disappeared. His mother learned that he had enlisted as a private in the Queen's Royal West Surrey under the name of "Thomas Hardy," giving his occupation as a farmer and his address as a coffee house. His regiment went to France. May 17th, in a hot action at Festubert, an officer called for ten volunteers to lead a hand grenade attack on the foremost German trench. It meant sure death, but "Hardy" was the first to volunteer.

Private R. Hall of the Fourth Queen's was the last to see "Hardy" alive. "His bravery was magnificent," said Hall. "He was dashing far ahead, with the shells falling around him. Shrapnel struck his right arm and took his hand away. Still he advanced, showering bombs with the uninjured hand. Then a bullet struck him and he went down. We buried him that night in a hero's grave."

The officer who mentioned "Hardy's" gallantry in dispatches didn't know the story. It came from the lips of his mother.
