fish from the hatchery that our streams
are stocked with; stuffed pheasants
and mounted deer, the game in our
country; finished samples of the differ-
ent woods and timber, our resources in
this direction. We are losing a great
opportunity, thousands of people now
on their vacations are attending the
exposition because they can go to the
coast and the fair at the same time.

A little later all of the farmers will
attend, and they ought to be interested.
Every man that comes into this coun-
try represents not only his family, but
a number of his friends. Every family
that comes here interests others. Every
family that is interested here
brings in their efforts, their money to
build up and extend the interests of
this country, buy land, trade with our
merchants, support our schools and
churches, build new roads and add
their help and work to our community
interests.

We are doing little to interest them.
We are neglecting an opportunity and
we are not supporting our representa-
tive, Mr. Sinnott, but are leaving him
to struggle along as best he can. We
have promised to help, and we will try
to write and interest outsiders in our

need trade and prosperity for all of
our people; let us do those things that
will make it. Do it now, each of you,
what you can. We have the best room

Want Take City Milk Supply

SEATTLE, Aug. 30.—A proposal in
on file with the city council by which
a private concern asks a franchise to
take over Seattle's entire milk supply
on a twenty-year contract. All milk
would be collected into a central milk
depot, incpected there under the super-
vision and regulation of city officials
and from there distributed with the
elimination of route duplication, which
at present keeps the milk cost up.

The city would receive 2 1/2 per cent
of the company's gross receipts. Under
the terms of the agreement the
city would have the option of
taking over the plant at five year in-
tervals, upon giving six months' notice.
The proposal will come before the
council tonight.

INDIANS COMPLAIN OF ILL TREATMENT

BIG CHIEFS WITH HYPHENATED
NAMES RESORT TO DIPLOMACY
INSTEAD OF TOMYHAWK TO
REGULATE ALLEGED WRONGS

WALKER, Minn., Aug. 30.—Return
of the Indian wars of seventeen years
ago—but this time diplomatic wars—
between the Indians and the federal
government, loomed up as a possibility
today. The reason is the allegation of
the Pillager band of Chippewa Indians
at Leech Lake that they have been
stung.

Way-shar-war-che-wabe, Gav-gwa-
chen-ung and Day-dah-che-nash, three
Indian orators, have represented to the
federal government that it has forgot-
ten to account for portions of the valu-
able pine timber land of the 275,000
acres set aside as a forest reserve. It
is further alleged that dams have over-
flowed 49,000 acres of their valuable
land, and that patents have been given
to portions of their land, contrary to
law.

Congressman Chipperfield, through
an interpreter, heard the protest for
the government, and promised to get
action on it in Washington.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—Operations
in Gallipoli indicate the complete fail-
ure of the first and second land offen-
sive movements toward subduing the
Dardanelles. They will be substituted
by a third plan, which is now being de-
veloped.

The first military effort of the allies
to open the way toward Constantinople
was in the form of a double attack on
Gallipoli on the Adriatic side. The
French disembarked on the Asiatic
side and the British forces effected
several landings in Gallipoli. This
parallel attempt was unsuccessful,
however. The French were driven back
into the sea, and the British were un-
able to hold the shore positions.

In the second plan, the English and
French forces concentrated in the
southern tip of Gallipoli, and made
this their sole offensive point. They
instituted a forward movement along
the line occupied by the French on
the Dardanelles side, and the British
on the Aegean side, but the movement
was again a failure.

In the third plan, the attempt to
reach the narrows from the south has
been postponed, while a new effort is
being made to drive across the penin-
sula from the west. This is the mean-
ing of the new operations in the Sulva
Bay district. The distance to be cov-
ered from the south or west is practi-
cally the same, from six to eight miles.
The advantage of the new offensive
movement is that a larger force can be
employed.

For the first time the allies are now
in a position to operate with a force
proportionate in strength to that of the
Mohammedans.

IMPROVED PLAN FOR SEGREGATION

LOS ANGELES' COUNCILWOMAN IS
IN FAVOR OF SEGREGATING
RED LIGHT DISTRICT WITH FEW
ALTERATION

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 30.—Mrs. Es-
telle Lawton, city councilwoman, fa-
vors a segregated district in Los An-
geles, but she favors it only under the
following conditions:

First—That the men be segregated
in the district with the women, and
kept there under the same condition of
social ostracism.
Second—That the restricted district
be walled about, with one gate bril-
liantly illuminated in a conspicuous
part of town, and that every man en-
tering get a license from the city clerk
and have his name printed in big black
letters in the newspapers.
Under these conditions Mrs. Lindsey
says she might vote for a segregated
district if the proposition comes before
the council. She declares that segre-
gated districts, as at present conduct-
ed, are forms of special privilege, and
that she is opposed to all forms of
special privilege.

An Ordinance Providing for the Con-
struction of Sidewalks on a Portion
of Esplanade Street, in Second Hot
Springs Addition.

THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS
ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1—That it is expedient and
necessary that sidewalks be con-
structed on the northerly side of Esplanade
street and fronting the following de-
scribed property: Lot 18 of block 51;
right of way of Southern Pacific com-
pany; right of way of United States of
America (used for irrigation canal),
and the piece or parcel described by
metes and bounds as: beginning at a
point on the northwesterly side of
Esplanade street, where the same in-
tersects the right of way of the United
States government canal on southerly
side; thence in a southerly direction
following the northwesterly line of
Esplanade street 169.2 feet to line of
way of Southern Pacific company;
thence in a northwesterly direction
along said right of way of Southern
Pacific company 480.4 feet to the in-
tersection of the right of way of said
Southern Pacific company and United
States government canal; thence in a
southeasterly direction to place of be-
ginning, the said parcel being design-
ated as lot D; all of said property
above described being situate in Sec-
ond Hot Springs Addition to the City
of Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Section 2—That the Common Coun-
cil hereby declares its intention to
construct said sidewalks, and directs
the Police Judge to give notice thereof,
and that the City Engineer post no-
tices, as by Charter provided; that the
plans, specifications of the City En-
gineer on file with the Police Judge
are hereby approved and adopted.
That the estimated cost of the con-
struction of said sidewalks as given
by the City Engineer is the sum of
\$30.00.

Section 3—That September 15, 1915,
is hereby fixed as the date for hearing
objections or remonstrances against
said proposed improvement.

Section 4—That the property herein-
before described be assessed for the
cost of said sidewalks.

Section 5—That the City of Klamath
Falls hereby elects to construct said
sidewalks, to employ the labor and to
purchase and furnish the material
necessary therefor.
