London—The strike situation in Wales is becoming more serious. Four thousand more are out and refuse to listen to appeals. Many more are expected to quit tonight.

Washington—Secretary Garrison has said that he could not permit Roosevelt's champion Wood to affect the relations of General Wood and the War department. He said, "The case is closed and the verdict must stand."

Big Auto Parade September 17th
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—The great automobile parade and pageant on September 17th, Congressional Union Day at the exposition, will be one of the most colorful and beautiful professional effects of the exposition year, the committee of women at work on the details claim. ASHLAND BONDS ARE DEFEATED

ASHLAND, Ore., August 30.—Last Wednesday's bond election resulted in a decided defeat of the proposition to bond the city for \$25,000, for the purchase of electric current and equipment from the California-Oregon Power company. The vote was 205 for and 559 against the proposed bonds. The voting strength of the city did not turn out, the vote being only about one-third of the total at previous elections. The fact that the city is already carrying bonds for large sums and some of the provisions of the proposed contract with the California-Oregon Power company making a high minimum on charges for current, are blamed for the defeat of the bond issue.
