What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—Premier Viviani of France and Sir Edward Grey, British foreign minister, have answered in entirely different moods the tentative peace suggestions made by Germany.

Viviani's reply contains a vague reference to France's determination to fight until Belgium has been freed and Alsace-Lorraine has been reconquered. Grey goes further than this patriotic generalization. With high statesmanship he discusses the German demand for the freedom of the seas, and admits that it is a fit subject for diplomatic negotiation. This is the biggest step toward securing peace England has taken.

Grey links the demand regarding the freedom of the seas with a counter demand regarding a limitation of armament. Germany must abandon every effort to collect indemnity from the allies, and must not impose her will on the world, which means, in all probability, that peace terms cannot be dictated by Germany, but must be made in a general agreement.

While it was reiterated by Grey, England will require the evacuation of Belgium as a part of the price for peace, but the future status of Alsace-Lorraine must be a secondary matter for Britain. If France cannot recover the lost provinces through her own efforts, England is scarcely justified in killing off her own male population to make a territorial gift to the French.

Premier Viviani's answer, as it touches on Alsace-Lorraine is not, in all probability, arousing much interest at Berlin.

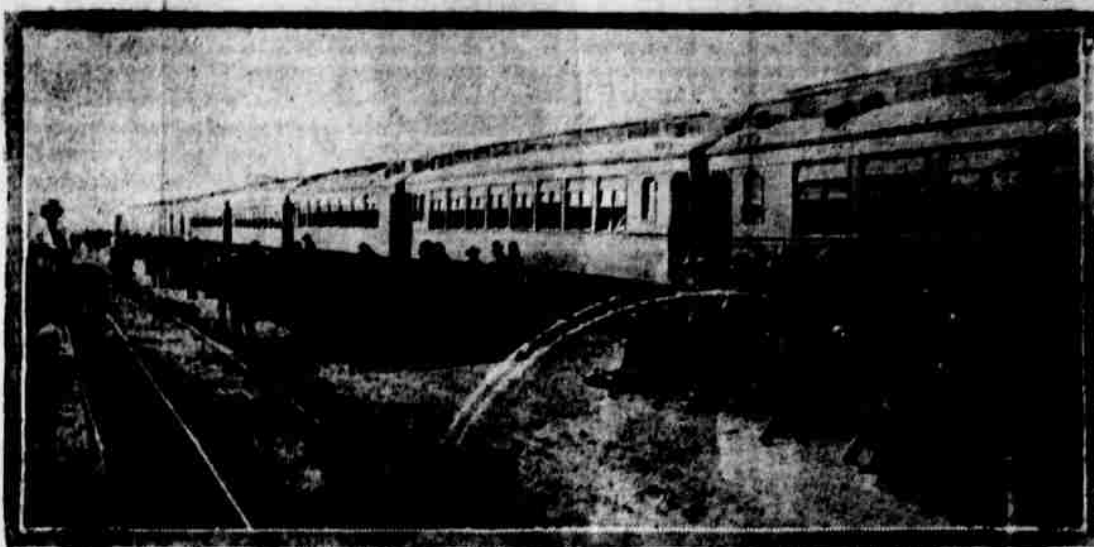

Oregon Building May Be Made Permanent

OREGON BUILDING, Panama-Pacific Exposition, Aug. 31.—The flights of the bird men, the fireworks and the races are the real drawing cards of this greatest of all expositions. The fireworks are ever indescribably beautiful and thrilling, the races are now on, and those who come during the months of September and October will see the most spectacular flying yet attempted at the exposition. Each week during these months Charles Niles of Marquette, Mich., and Silvio Petrosini of Buenos Ayres will give four flights each, providing, of course, that there is no fatality.

In his trial flight about two weeks ago, Niles dropped from a considerable height into the bay. As he fell he unbuckled himself from the machine, and climbed to the top as it hit the water, escaping injury other than a cut or two about the face. Subsequently he made a flight, and demonstrated that he can cut a few capers not thought of by the other fellows. Petrosini, in a monoplane, soared to great heights, let out a few corkscrew twists never witnessed here, then dropped to within ten feet of the ground while 40,000 witnesses held their breath, awaiting the outcome of this thriller. When these two wonderful flyers get into competition with each other the crowds are likely to see the most daring stunts ever attempted by aviators. Don't imagine that you would not care to witness such daring—you will, and while you are here you will not miss a flight if it is possible to see it. The spectacle is awe-inspiring, and men playing with death for the sport of the multitude produce a thrill no different that all like it.

May Save Oregon Building

If George M. Hyland can accomplish it, the Oregon building will be preserved along with the Fine Arts Palace and the dome of the Horticultural Palace. The matter has been broached to exposition officials, and it is said that President Moore and Commissioner R. E. Hale have given the idea their hearty endorsement. Mr. Hyland and the Oregon commission are doing all that is possible to bring about this greatly to be desired disposition of the Oregon structure. This building is on Presidio or government ground, and if the government will make certain concessions the Oregon Parthenon will stand for many years as a magnificent advertisement of Oregon resources. While the structure contains a vast quantity of marketable lumber, it is said that the salvage would bring no more than the cost of removing the structure, so there is added reason for leaving the building stand as it is. It is a tremendously substantial building, could be made to serve splendid purposes for many years to come, and would prove an exposition landmark that thousands would find pleasure in viewing.

Like Oregon School Methods

Oregonians will be glad to know that school methods now in vogue in both city and rural schools throughout the state are counted in the forefront by educators throughout the country. During the time the National Education Association was in session here, hundreds of the leading educators spent much time at the Oregon school exhibits in the Oregon building and the Palace of Education, were enthusiastic in praise of the work so effectively attempted, and more than a few made complete copies of the methods as exemplified in the exhibits. Several Cal-

ifornia superintendents signified their determination to institute the methods of standardization, and in three instances have already done so. H. W. Fought of the United States department of rural education had pictures taken of the work exemplified in the Palace of Education and will present the Oregon rural methods in a special bulletin soon to be sent broadcast throughout the nation. Several foreign commissioners have gone into Oregon methods exhaustively, and will adopt them in their native lands. The exhibit of the Portland School of Trades, the public schools of that city and the manual training and art work of the high schools of Oregon, as shown in the Oregon building, has attracted many to the building, and the interest has

been such that none can doubt the universal confidence that Oregon schools are doing an advanced work along right lines. This certainly ought to prove an encouragement to those directing the work, and to the people who are paying the taxes by which the work is made possible.

An Ordinance Providing for the Construction of Sidewalks on a Portion of Esplanade Street, in Second Hot Springs Addition.

THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS
ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1.—That it is expedient and necessary that sidewalks be constructed on the northerly side of Esplanade street and fronting the following described property: Lot 16 of block 41; right of way of Southern Pacific company; right of way of United States of America (used for irrigation canal), and the piece or parcel described by metes and bounds as: beginning at a point on the northwesterly side of Esplanade street, where the same intersects the right of way of the United States government canal on southerly side; thence in a southerly direction following the northwesterly line of Esplanade street 169.4 feet to right of way of Southern Pacific company; thence in a northwesterly direction along said right of way of Southern Pacific company 480.4 feet to the intersection of the rights of way of said Southern Pacific company and United States government canal; thence in a southerly direction to place of beginning, the said parcel being designated as lot D; all of said property above described being situate in Second Hot Springs Addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Section 2.—That the Common Council hereby declares its intention to construct said sidewalks, and directs the Police Judge to give notice thereof, and that the City Engineer post notices, as by Charter provided; that the plans, specifications of the City Engineer on file with the Police Judge are hereby approved and adopted. That the estimated cost of the construction of said sidewalks as given by the City Engineer is the sum of \$80.00.

Section 3.—That September 15, 1915, is hereby fixed as the date for hearing objections or remonstrances against said proposed improvement.

Section 4.—That the property heretofore described be assessed for the cost of said sidewalks.

Section 5.—That the City of Klamath Falls hereby elects to construct said sidewalks, to employ the labor and to purchase and furnish the material necessary therefor.

TWO TESTS FOR ANY CIGARETTE
