ENGLISH INCOME TAX MAY BE RAISED FORTY PER CENT TO HELP COVER MONSTROUS EXPENSE OF GREAT WAR

LONDON, Sept. 21.—A 40 per cent increase in the income tax and other drastic levies are proposed in the budget introduced in the house of commons. It is estimated the annual revenue is \$1,300,000, and the expenditures \$7,950,000.

The budget proposes to abolish the half-penny postage and increase telegraph rates 50 per cent.

PLAN DIVERTING FARMERS' TRAIN

WOULD DRAW EXCURSION OF EASTERN FARMERS INTO THIS COUNTY TO VIEW LANDS AND PRODUCTS

One of the biggest advertising schemes yet suggested for Klamath county and one of the cheapest is under the consideration of prominent business men and the Commercial Club.

It's nucleus was the fact that an entire trainload of the progressive farmers of the Middle West leave Chicago, in a special train, for the San Francisco fair, October 9th. They are going to see the fair, and, incidentally, all the agricultural lands their train chances to pass through.

The scheme is that Southern Pacific officials be petitioned to have this special leave Weed on the main line and come up into this country. At Klamath Falls would be automobiles waiting, with a good guide in each, to take these men to the farming section, particularly the irrigated lands. Also to have the winning products of all three of the district fairs at Klamath Falls that day for exhibition purposes. It is everywhere conceded that the advertising value of the scheme would be enormous.

The train leaves Chicago on the Santa Fe line, but to persuade the farmers to take the Portland route home would be the easiest part of the scheme, for they undoubtedly would wish to take a different route from the one on which they came. Considerable work will be necessary to perfect the scheme, but already several men are investigating its feasibility.

119,000 ACRES WILL BE OPENED

LARGE TRACT IN SOUTHEASTERN OREGON TO BE THROWN OPEN FOR SETTLEMENT ON THE 20TH OF OCTOBER

One hundred and nineteen thousand thousand acres of land, some of it valuable for farming or stock raising, but much of it practically waste land, was opened for settlement Monday in South Central Oregon. This area forms the last section of the former Paulina forest reserve, which has been discontinued as a reserve, and the lands divided for administration among the Crater, Fremont and Deschutes reserves.

The date for making entry is October 20, thirty days after the date on which settlement is allowed. The elimination was announced in a presidential proclamation issued July 19, the forest service found the lands unfit for its purposes, and brought about the elimination.

After the settlement date the Lakeview land office will have jurisdiction over the former forest lands.

STOCK EXHIBITS TO DRAW CROWDS

OCTOBER AND NOVEMBER WILL BE STOCKMEN'S MONTHS AT FAIR—\$175,000 IN PRIZES WILL BE GIVEN

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 21.—October and November will offer much calculated to delight the stockmen of the Northwest, this being the time of the big shows of all farm animals. Horses and mules will have fall swing from October 1 to 13, and cattle, beef and dairy animals from October 18 to November 1. Sheep, goats and swine come in for display from November 3 to November 15, and the car lots of livestock will be shown from November 11 to November 14.

D. O. Lively, chief of the livestock department, well known to most Oregonians, says there is every reason to believe that the showing of animals at the exposition during the two months will be superb. The exposition has offered \$175,000 for cash prizes, besides \$15,000 for a special horse show. Forty-five breed record associations

have provided \$100,327 for special trophies and premiums, and various state commissions to the exposition have appropriated \$150,320 for live stock prizes, transportation and expenses, making a grand total of \$440,357 for live stock participation in the series of shows.

Cattle come in for the largest share, the money offered by the exposition, the breed record associations and states totaling \$148,667, excluding

trophies. The appropriations for horses amount to \$128,472; swine \$62,572; sheep and goats \$54,882; poultry, pigeons and pet stock, \$13,750; dogs and cats, \$5,500.
