

Tide of War Turns Everywhere for Allies

Bulgaria Has Sent an Ultimatum to Serbia Is Reported

ARTILLERY DUEL OF HISTORY NOW WAGES ON FRONT

SUCCESS WILL RELIEVE RUMENIA—CROWDS GATHER

War Will Last All Year, No Matter How Successful Allies Are—Make Unbroken Advance—Reinforcements Put Weak Spots in German Line—Believed Victories Will Have Wholesome Bulgarian Effect.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 27.—The Kaiser is preparing to move his headquarters to Luxemburg Friday, because of developments on the western front.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—Reinforcements have plugged the weak spots in the German lines, made by the unslackened movements of the allied advance in France. Desperate efforts have failed to stop the allies, according to the Paris communique.

South of Lens, in Champagne, the Germans checked charges on a wide front. About Arras and Lens, the French are making important progress.

The tide of war is turning everywhere for the allies, it is believed here. The greatest artillery battle in history is being waged along the German-French Flanders front.

PARIS, Sept. 27.—The allies' brilliant successes in the west will not only relieve the Russians, but will probably have a wholesome effect in Bulgaria. Enthusiastic crowds are gathered everywhere, and faces are beaming.

It is realized that the war will probably last all year, no matter how successful the allies are this autumn.

High powered explosives and shrapnel are being used between Briecourt and the section north of Waques farm. The Germans are heavily bombarding, evidently in preparation for a rifle encounter. Many places have been abandoned by them.

PAT FITZGERALD ON WAY BACK FROM VISIT TO OLD COUNTRY WHEN HE MEETS DEATH IN OCEAN DISASTER

LAKEVIEW, Sept. 27.—Pat Fitzgerald, a brother of Con Fitzgerald of Plush, went down with the Arabic which was torpedoed by the Germans some time ago off the coast of England, according to the reports which have reached Lakeview. Pat left Lakeview about three years ago for the old country, and was on his way back to Salt Lake City. His brother, Con, is a prominent sheep man of Delane, a town a few miles north of Plush.

With the report of the drowning of Mr. Fitzgerald there also comes word that a man by the name of Nolan was also drowned. He is a brother of Dennis Nolan, a partner in the sheep business with Mike Sullivan.

FLAMES DESTROY HOUSE SUNDAY

HOME OF O. M. HECTOR BURNS SUNDAY AFTERNOON—PART OF FURNITURE SAVED—ED MARTIN OWNED PROPERTY

The house occupied by O. M. Hector in Hot Springs addition was destroyed by fire early Sunday afternoon. The fire company made a quick run, but arrived too late to save the property.

The fire is believed to have been started by children playing in the wood shed. The children's story is rather confused, but they apparently tried in vain to put out the fire before they alarmed Mr. and Mrs. Hector. The furniture on the lower floor was saved, but that upstairs was destroyed.

The house was a two-story structure, and one of the best in the Hot Springs addition. It was owned by Ed Martin, as was the furniture on the lower floor.

The loss was partly covered by insurance.

BERLIN ADMITS BUT TWO BREAKS IN WEST FRONT

DOES NOT FEAR ALLIES HEAVY EST BLOWS

Furious Battle Waging in Champagne. French Capture 300 Officers and Several Positions—Hold Artois. Germans Claim No Serious Set Backs Since Battle of Marne—Loss of Allies Thought Enormous.

PARIS, Sept. 27.—It is announced that the French have captured more positions. A furious battle is waging in Champagne. The French are attacking the whole Champagne front, and the capture of 300 officers has already been achieved. The French are holding Artois.

BERLIN, Sept. 27.—The heaviest blows from the allies since the battle of the Marne has made no impression on the German lines, officials stated. Only in two places has the German line been affected.

Berlin knows the strength of their positions on the western front, and does not fear the allies' mightiest efforts will shatter them. It is estimated that the loss of the allies has been enormous. The British objective is Lille. They have been repulsed everywhere except near Loos.

BERLIN, Sept. 27.—It is announced that the British offensive in Lille is at a complete standstill as a result of strong counter attacks. The French have continued their desperate assaults about Souchez Arras. Last night they were repulsed with heavy losses.

New York Politician Wanted for Murder

Mike Rofrano, till lately deputy street cleaning commissioner in the reform administration of Mayor Mitchell, is now wanted by the police as the instigator of the murder of Mike Gaimari, another Italian, who was killed some months ago.

It is another case of those stories of underworld life in New York. Gaimari was a lieutenant of Tom Foley, Tammany leader of the Second Assembly district, which contains thousands of Jews and Italians. To beat Foley, Rofrano's crowd thought it necessary to get rid of Gaimari. He was murdered. Several men have been convicted in connection with the crime, but not until recently did the New York district attorney get sufficient evidence to obtain an indictment against Rofrano, who disappeared a day or two before the action of the grand jury became generally known.

GRAND LODGE OF MASONS TO MEET

THOUSANDS OF ORDER WILL ATTEND ANNUAL COMMUNICATION AT THE PANAMA-PACIFIC EXPOSITION

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 27.—Many hundreds of members of the Order of Masons of California will attend the sixty-sixth annual communication of the Grand Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons of the California Jurisdiction, which will be held in San Francisco under the auspices of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, beginning October 13th. Grand Master Benjamin F. Bledsoe has notified the exposition authorities that he expects the largest attendance of any convocation of the order ever held in the state.

The school of instruction will open October 10th in the newly completed Masonic Temple, and will continue until October 17th, with several days intermission. The Grand Lodge sessions will commence Tuesday, October 13th, at 10 a. m., in the Temple.

CITY DESTROYED BY EXPLOSION; SCORES KILLED

ARDMORE, OKLAHOMA, SUFFERS GASOLINE EXPLOSION

City of 10,000 Swept by Flames—Aid Sought From Nearby Towns—Relief Trains Rushed Physicians, Nurses and Supplies—At Least a Score Killed and Hundred Injured. Fire Sweeps Unchecked.

DURANT, Okla., Sept. 27.—Ardmore, a city of 10,000 population, thirty miles west of here, was practically destroyed in a terrific explosion of gasoline, according to advises received here late this afternoon.

At least a score are reported dead, and a hundred injured. Fire started in several wrecked buildings, and is reported to be sweeping through the ruined city unchecked.

Aid has been asked of surrounding towns. Relief trains, physicians and nurses are being rushed.

LATE BULLETIN

Seattle—A Canadian donation to the allies is five submarines, shipped last February to North Vancouver, where they are under construction.

Berlin—It is officially reported that German aircraft bombed Russian warships in the Gulf of Riga. One ship was hit squarely, and the others steamed northward.

Berlin—An Austrian submarine sunk a French transport in the Libyan Sea, according to an Athens dispatch. The transport was en route for Cyprus.

Washington—The president is considering the advisability of retaining the present tariff on sugar as means of additional revenue. Increasing the duties on liquor and a possible lowering of the exemption class of the income tax are other considered measures.

Chicago—Five thousand clothing makers have struck and 40,000 more will go out tonight. Reserves have been ordered to the garment making district.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 27.—Musicians of San Francisco put on their brightest uniforms today for the American Federation of Musicians' Day at the Panama-Pacific exposition. Musicians from all parts of the state participated. A parade preceded the day's ceremonies.

BULGARIA HESITATES TO TAKE PLUNGE, REPORT

Stated Semi-Officially That Roumania Won't Order General Mobilization Because of Bulgaria's Ultimatum to Serbia—London Enthusiastic—Bulgaria Is Asked to Explain Mobilization—Situation Deadlocked.

WILL CELEBRATE STAY OF RELIC

SCHOOL CHILDREN TO ASSIST IN CELEBRATION OF VISIT OF LIBERTY BELL TO SAN DIEGO. PAGEANT IS FEATURE

SAN DIEGO, Sept. 27.—Although the famous Liberty Bell will not arrive at the San Diego exposition until November 13th, already plans are being made for a monster three-day celebration during the stay of the historic relic. The Liberty Bell will arrive shortly after midnight of November 13th.

School children will play an important part in the exercises to be held during the celebration. It has been arranged for 5,000 school children to dress in red, white and blue to form a mammoth flag. The children are now being drilled while the costumes are being prepared. Another feature will include an immense historical pageant, in which the various important periods in the country's history will be depicted. There will start with the Revolutionary War, and include nationally important events up to the present day.
