SLOW FIRES, HORRORS OF
TURKISH MASSACRE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 1.—Armenian babies torn to pieces and males tortured over slow fires are some of the horrors of the organized Turkish massacres of the Armenians, according to the report of the American atrocities committee to be published Monday.

The violation of girls, babies impaled on swords and families are also reported.
