

TO DEFEND POOR IN LAW COURTS

LEAGUE OF PUBLIC DEFENSE
WILL SUPPLY ATTORNEY FOR
THOSE CHARGED WITH CRIME
WITHOUT FRIENDS OR FUNDS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—Plans for helping those unfortunate persons charged with crime who are without funds or friends, have been laid by the Public Defense League. The league proposes to supply an attorney whenever needed.

The league members point out that in many places the office of Public Defender is already established by law, but the act passed by the last California legislature creating that office failed to become a law, lacking the approval of the governor.

H. O. Averill, secretary of the league says:

"The popular idea that a poor man has no show is subversive of respect for the law, and is not entirely unfounded, the rich criminal frequently being acquitted while the poor innocent is frequently convicted. The state provides a large staff of well paid attorneys for the prosecution, but makes no provision for the defense."

PANAMA LAND NOW OPENED

LARGE TRACT OF WORLD'S MOST

Many of our local people will call to mind six or seven years ago when land was being sold in Cuba and the Hawaiian Islands that they were given the opportunity to purchase acreage in these garden spots at a ridiculously low figure. It is stated that Miller closed a deal with a representative of a land company, who accompanied him to Panama from San Francisco, for the purchase of 100,000 acres of timber land. The purchase price is not named, but it is said to have been quite large.

The land is situated in that portion of the canal zone noted for its hard wood timber, and it is said to be one of the finest tracts in Panama.

Among those who are interested in the syndicate are Superior Judge H. D. Gregory, F. E. Ford, C. F. Wick, James Williams, Supervisor C. E. Porter, Robert Campbell and W. M. Bille.

For the present the land will be allowed to remain in its natural state, but later the syndicate expects to cut and market the timber, which will net a good profit on the investment.

The soil is fertile, and when the land is cleared it is proposed to plant the various crops native to that country.

From the Chico Daily Tribune, September 3, 1915:

A deal of much importance and far reaching interest has just been consummated whereby A. N. Mahon, William Rouse, Charles Sommes and David Aitken, all prominent Chico people, have purchased 3000 acres of rich agricultural and timber land in the Rancho El Encanto, near the big canal, in Panama.

The tract is located where the finest climatic conditions exist, and where splendid markets are transportation facilities are easy at hand. The whole plantation is all the finest kind of soil, part of which is covered with rich forests of mahogany, Spanish cedar and rubber trees, and groves of wild coconuts, pineapples and bananas abound in abundance.

The new owners expect to develop and plant part of the tract in the very near future to sugar cane and the various fruits native to that country. The consideration is not named but it is known that it runs into a large sum. The deal was made through the S. L. Bainbridge Realty Co., the local representative of the Panama Land and Timber Co.

Many similar syndicates have been formed in California and the near future will see thousands of acres of this rich soil under cultivation and values soar to a considerable height.

The price being asked for this land is really less than one can homestead for. Prices range from \$3.50 to \$5 per acre, the terms of sale being ten per cent down and the balance in three years, being distributed in equal monthly payments. No interest or taxes are paid by the investor. One great and unusual feature of the proposition is that even after the land is paid for, there is no tax on land in not taken in the Republic of Panama.

Can Alexander do It Alone? Question of Day

BOSTON, Oct. 8.—Baseball's biggest battlefield was cleared for action today, and the combatant Phillies and Red Sox stripped to fighting trim for the conflict that will send another world series hurtling into baseball history.

Seldom in baseball's history have two teams stood on the brink of a world series clash with so much diversity of opinion regarding their relative merit. If it were possible to take an electoral vote of the neutral spectators, it is quite probable the judge would declare a dead heat.

The Phillies, piloted by Irish Pat Moran, didn't figure from a team standpoint. It was Alexander against the Red Sox, not the Phillies, according to fandom's version of the annual drama.

Never has one player, and one alone, carried the burden of his side's offense and defense on his shoulders to such an extent as does the big Nebraska this breezy October day.

"Can Alexander do it alone?" That question has probably been asked and answered a million times since the vanguard of the world series crowds began drifting into the city. All others faded into insignificance in crowded hotel lobbies and streets. One never heard "what can the Red Sox do?" It was "what can Alexander do?"

Long before daylight there was a sleepy stream of bleacher fans lined up on either side of the box office window for the coveted tickets. Some intended seeing the annual classic; some didn't. The latter class was taking a long chance of selling the bits of pasteboard for from three to five, and even ten, times what they paid for them. Some persons called the scalpers and speculators.

That Alexander will pitch the first game goes without saying, although the tactician Moran has not said so yet. But Alex is Philadelphia's only ace—it can be played, then pulled back and played again, and quite probably again. It seemed probable this forenoon that Ernest Shore would get the call from Bill Carrigan, although in some quarters it was predicted that Dutch Leonard, Boston's prize southpaw, might be sacrificed.

Baseball men themselves, players and managers, were pretty much divided on the outcome. National Leaguers—those who have battled futility at the writhing slants of Alexander through a long, weary season—are for him, strong. They don't think he can lose. On the other hand, the American Leaguers, who have worked against Boston's prize trio—Shore, Foster and Leonard—can't see how the American League entry can lose.

One thing that American League adherents pointed to with much confidence was the result of the recent Detroit-Boston series, in which the Red Sox really won the pennant. They pointed to the fact that Detroit, with Cobb, Crawford and Veach—one of the strongest batting clubs baseball has seen in years, couldn't do anything to the finely balanced staff of

Carrigan. And what chance, they queried, has a comparatively weak hitting aggregation like the Phillies got against them?

On the other hand Philadelphians pointed to the fact, undeniable, that the clan of Carrigan never has faced a pitcher of Alexander's caliber.

At last accounts the arguments stood a draw. It will take the games to decide.

Sealed proposals in duplicate, each envelope marked "Proposal for Timber, Klamath Reservation," will be received at the office of the superintendent of the Klamath Indian school, Klamath Agency, Oregon, until 12 o'clock noon, Pacific Coast time, Wednesday, November 2, 1915, for the purchase of approximately 5,000,000 feet of yellow pine timber on the Klamath Indian reservation, Oregon. This timber is upon portions of sections 14, 15, 22 and 23, township 33 south, range 7 1/2 east, Willamette Meridian. The timber offered for sale is tributary to Wood River, a drivable stream. The minimum price which will be accepted is \$2.50 per 1,000 feet for yellow pine. The timber must be cut under regulations prescribed by the Secretary of the Interior. All timber must be cut and removed prior to June 1, 1916. With the bid a certified check on a solvent national bank must be submitted in the amount of \$500. This check will be returned to unsuccessful bidders, applied towards the payment for timber if bid is accepted, and retained as a forfeit if a bid is accepted and the bidder fails to comply with the requirements of his bid.
