BUY AT HOME

IT MAY sound homely, but we say it again, "Buy at Home." When a man sets up a factory in a community he benefits every human being in that community. He may employ but one man, but he must live near his factory, use raw materials, occupy floor space, consume lights, purchase clothing, pay rent or buy land, and purchase food, most of which comes from the farm.

If his goods are sold outside of the county he draws from remote districts sustenance for his community. This is new money and new life. If he sells his goods at home, he pays the money back to the community, and this is healthy circulation, not loss of blood.

This money stays at home. The makers of raw material get a share, the transportation man gets something, the factory hand gets a very large portion, the manufacturer a small per cent, the tax collector his mill, and all turn it back to the community. But the moment the money is sent to a distant city it is forever lost to producer, drayman, worker, manufacturer, farmer, tax man and the community.

This, then, being of all things most true, let us buy from our people, for ourselves, here at home, for to keep money in a community is healthy circulation, to get money into the community is new blood, to send money away from home is to bleed the community to death.

The day of promise is gone, the hour of performance is at hand; talk is cheap, but it takes coin to make a country prosperous, and while it may sound homely, we are bound to say, "Buy at Home."

SON OF RULERS GOES TO WORK

BUT ROMANTIC WORK DOES HAR- BY LAMBERT, DESCENDENT OF ROBERT THE DEVIL AND IRISH KINGS, CHOOSE

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Harry Lambert of this city took a big step forward in his "thrilling, romantic and distinguished" (the adjectives are his friends) career here today.

Read this brief record, then, before reading the last line, and see if you can guess what he did today.

Captain Harry Lambert is a direct descendant of Robert the Devil and the Seven Kings of Ireland. His uncle, Colonel Legge, is the chief quarry to King George and his family has served English royalty for 600 years. Earl of Cowen, famous yachtsman, was his grandfather. The present earl, his cousin, is Major General of General French's staff. Last year Lambert was struck by lightning. He served in the Queen's colors in India, Egypt, Basutoiland and the Boer War, was mentioned in dispatches for bravery seven times, and was congratulated by Queen Victoria and Lord Roberts for capturing General Andros Cronje and 1,300 ammunitionless men, single handed. His father, Major Fred Lambert, was the original of the hero in Rider Haggard's "Jess." His mother, Catherine Maxwell, owned Calderwood castle in Scotland. His wife is a cousin of the present Lord Baltimore, Alfred Calvert. Her uncle is quarry to the King of Italy, and her grandfather is an exiled Russian nobleman.

Well, what did Lambert do today? He took a job with a motion picture company—vice president and producer.

Bloody Angle Soldiers Honor Webb United Press Service

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 12.—One hundred and fifty veterans of the Philadelphia brigade which helped repulse Pickett's charge at Bloody Angle, Gettysburg battlefield, July 5, 1865, left today in a special Philadelphia and Reading car to attend the reunion and dedication of General Webb's monument to be unveiled today at Gettysburg. The veterans are all members of the 69th, 71st and 166th regiments, which constituted the brigade of which General Webb was the commander. They will be headed by Brigadier General G. J. R. Miller and Adjutant John R. Worman.

Her Grandmother Was Robbed of Valuable Jewelry

One of the largest jewelry robberies in many years was that of Mrs. James McMillan, widow of the late United States senator from Michigan, at her summer home, Eagle Head, at Manchester-by-the-Sea, in Massachusetts, when valuables worth \$75,000 were taken from the house. And it has become one of the most mysterious cases on which detectives have had to work. One agency was called off after considerable investigation had been made.

Mrs. Preston Gibson, granddaughter of Mrs. McMillan, was with her at the time. Mrs. McMillan kept her jewelry in a safe near her room. Mrs. McMillan saved some \$6,000 worth of her jewelry because she wore a \$4,000 pair of earrings and a \$2,000 necklace to bed. Detectives said they could learn nothing about the case, but a statement was made by a company which insured the valuables that \$42,000 had been paid to Mrs. McMillan.

The first supply of 150 so kindly donated by the Northern Pacific railway, was quickly exhausted, but the committee has received another shipment of 400 more of the same interesting booklets. On Saturday the contest committee will offer more bargains, for whatever entries may remain unsampled by the judges will be sold to the public.

Still more bargains are to follow, for the Philanthropic Department of the Women's Club has charge of the free distribution of all Klamath grown apples entered in the contest. The young folks in the domestic science classes of the high and grammar schools are manifesting great interest in the outcome.
