WHAT THE WAR MOVES MEAN

By J. W. T. MASON
(Written for the United Press)

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—The resignation of Theophile Delcasse as minister of foreign affairs of France, as almost certainly due to the refusal of the British and French governments to follow his advice about the best way of dealing with the Balkans, England's foreign secretary, Sir Edward Grey, was given control of negotiations with the Balkans. Grey's failure in these negotiations was apparently Delcasse's reason for no longer supporting the Britisher's methods.

Delcasse always a strong advocate of prepared diplomacy. In the present instance, preparedness meant the dispatch of a large army, for quick action, through Greece to check the Tenth at the Serbian border, and to overcome the Bulgarians. This army ought to have been sent early in the course of the diplomatic battles at Sofia, when the allies and Germany were dicker for Bulgaria's aid. After Bulgarian mobilization began, Great Britain held back, and France had to urge her before even the present inadequate expedition was sent to Salonika.

When two men possessing strong personalities, as Delcasse and Grey do, one of them must eventually retire.

It is possible that Grey counted too much on past British prestige in the Balkans to swing affairs the ally's way. Delcasse, on the other hand, noticed the decline of British influence there, and urged preparation against an unfavorable decision on Bulgaria's part. Grey prevailed, however, and failed in his mission. Delcasse's resignation is in effect a demand for an international commission which will permit no one capital in the future to control the diplomatic negotiations of the allies.

ELMER LYNCH GETS SIX MONTHS IN MULTNOMAH JAIL FOR CATTLE RUSTLING—ATTORNEY ASKED FOR LENIENCY

A jury in the federal court at Medford returned a verdict of guilty in the case of Elmer Lynch, a Klamath Indian, accused of cattle stealing. A sentence of six months in the Multnomah county jail, without costs, was imposed, after a plea for leniency had been made by Attorney E. F. Mulvey, and a kindly lecture had been administered by the court. Lynch is the father of eight children, and heretofore a law-abiding resident. This trial marked the close of the present term of court.

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

(Extract from sermon preached in the Presbyterian church, Sunday, October 3, 1915, by the pastor, Charles T. Hurd.)
The Church and Its Mission to a Modern Community.

"They have no need to go away: give ye them to eat."—Matt. 14:16.

The opening address of the World's Christian Citizenship Conference held in Portland some months ago was delivered by Dr. Coyle of Denver. He used as his platform of principle an expression quoted from Henry George and I want to quote it today as expressing the conception of Jesus: "I am for men." It was his platform, it was the essence of all for which he lived and for which he bled. He had no other motive, and no other aim. His whole earth life was summed up in that expression. If he had been for anything lower he would never have risen above the obscurity of those law-abiding Galilean and Judean hills. If the ideal which he set is still far away, it is refreshing to look upon it and to know that it is closer than it used to be, and to know, too, that some day it will be realized.

In the past there may have been an emphasis on things, and an underemphasis on men and women, but we are coming to see that it is not so now, and in language that can not be misunderstood, the blood of the Man of Galilee has written upon the heart of the world the value and sacredness of human life—the infinite worth of a man. We need today to get his vision and his viewpoint as he saw the world about him, "as sheep needing a shepherd," as a "field ready for the harvest," as men "in darkness," or "sick and in prison and hungry," etc.

OUR PROBLEM.

A small group of puzzled, anxious men were facing a hungry, restless multitude. It was sundown, and they were perplexed as to what to do with them. This massing of men brings problems which no one man can bring. The disciples had helped individuals often, but this crowd was something new to them, and it startled them. Their only suggestion was one of evasion and escape: "Send them away." But Jesus answered: "They have no need to go away: give ye them to eat." The massing of men brings big problems to the church that are different in these days from the problems of twenty-five-fifty years ago. It is our problem to meet the changing conditions and to find out what God wants done and to bring the old spiritual power of the Gospel of Jesus to bear by every means upon the surging life of today. The church has too often said: "We will tell men how to get to heaven, but with their social, political and commercial life, we have no real con-

cern." When confronted with the problem of the multitude we have too often said, "Send them away." And they have gone from us, when in reality there is no form of human life which the life of Jesus Christ and the Gospel he taught does not touch and help to solve.

II—OUR TASK.

Here is a most serious question of our times. "Is Christianity able to establish right relations between man and man," and the answer must always be, "It is able," but the world has too often lost faith, not in our sacred book, but in the vitality of our Christianity. This ought not to be so.

—The church exists to guide and mold and determine the religious thought and sentiment of a community.

Men are asking: "What shall I think about God? What shall I think about the Bible? What shall I think about myself and the life to come?" and other questions like that, and though many unkind things are said about it, yet the church is today the best teacher of righteousness and right living which we have. It must address itself to the highest intelligence of men and suggest lines of thinking on high and noble objects.

It has been sneered at as a moral policeman, and it may well accept the intended reproach as a title of honor. It is a policeman that persuades people to behave without a club and without threat of prison. It appeals to the moral sentiment of men. It must emphasize right ideals of conduct and must live them. It must seek to develop a public conscience, and emphasize all ethical standards of life.

—It must minister to individual needs of men.

They want to get a new impulse, and the church must give it. They want comfort—they have problems to be solved—they are weak, and they are lonely, and in their deepest needs they have a right to turn to the church for help. It must have, too, a social message for the world of today and in the varied forms of life there is no place where it is not ready and organized to help men.

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E. J. HANNA WILL RECEIVE PALLIUM

HISTORIC SERVICE OF CATHOLICS WILL ACCOMPANY PRESENTATION OF ARCHBISHOP'S INSIGNIA TO HANNA

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16.—An historic incident in the history of the Catholic church will occur tomorrow, when his grace, Archbishop Edward J. Hanna will receive the pallium, the insignia of the office of an archbishop. The ceremony will be held at St. Mary's cathedral, and a pontifical mass will be celebrated in connection. Because of the European war, the usual custom of having an apostolic delegation bring on the pallium directly from the pope at Rome was not followed, and no ceremonies attended the delivery of the insignia in San Francisco.

The pallium is an elaborately embroidered siltken stole. In medieval times it was refined with touches of ermine and the most expensive jewels. Now it is without fur or jewels.
