## PAT LAVEY NOW MAKING SHRAPNEL

FORMER PROMOTER, WHO GOT INTO TROUBLE IN PORTLAND, IS NOW MAKING REAL MONEY AND LOTS OF IT

Pat C. Lavey, who had a spectacular career in Portland as a promoter and land boomer, and was also well known in Klamath Falls, where he was interested in placing on the market the townsites of Worden and Mt. Hebron, is now manufacturing shrapnel for the allies, according to a Portland newspaper story.

Lavey was sentenced to a year in jail in Portland for fraud, and when his term expired he became interested with a man who had a small plant at Cleveland, Ohio, and was busy devising metal toys for the Christmas trade when the flood of orders for shrapnel shells came from Europe.

The plant, while small, happened to be equipped with just the sort of machinery required for turning out the shells, and Lavey succeeded in landing an order which will keep him busy for some time to come. Incidentally he is rolling up a nice bank account because of the orders.
