MANY WANT LAND IN EASTERN ORE.

INQUIRIES DAILY FOR CHEAP LAND SHOWS EFFECTIVENESS OF ADVERTISING AT THE EXPOSITION

(Herald Special Service)

OREGON BUILDING, P. P. I. E., Oct. 20.—The crowds at the exposition to continue 60,000 daily, and the number here from distant points, the Far East and the Middle West, appears to be on the increase. The inquiries are many and specific, and the prospect of interesting people in Oregon seems very great. Very naturally, much of the inquiry is about "cheap lands," and there are many who want to know about homesteads, but the majority are interested in possibility of production and climatic conditions rather than something "cheap." In fact, prices quoted, \$50 to \$150 for land easily accessible to railroad or community, is surprising to most of the inquirers, many of whom are from sections where land is quoted at double or treble that figure.

The different representatives here say that there are many inquiries about small acreage near the larger communities, and all agree that there is constant questioning about Eastern Oregon. Some tremendously effective advertising must have been done for that section of the state within the past two or three years for very many from distant points seem to have some familiarity with the region, and want to know more about its opportunities.

The inquiries generally seem to be favorably impressed with Oregon's showing here, and many who had not thought of going into the state at this time say they will at least take a short look at this time and come back later to stay.

RETAIN SINNOTT FOR EXTRA WEEK

CAPTAIN SIEMENS WILL INVESTIGATE PLAN TO ASK KLAMATH REPRESENTATIVE TO STAY THROUGH OREGON WEEK.

Captain and Mrs. J. W. Siemens left today for the San Francisco exposition to be present at Klamath Day. While there Captain Siemens will confer with Phil Sinnott to investigate whether the Klamath representative should be asked to stay for one more week to be on hand for the proposed Oregon building festivities.

The planned festivities will draw thousands of visitors daily to the Oregon building—more than at any time during the exposition. Governor Withcombe will be present to officiate, and all sorts of features have been planned for the entertainment of the guests. Many of the business men think that Sinnott should be present throughout this week, to take charge of the Klamath exhibit, and tell the guests about Klamath county.

If Captain Siemens finds the Oregon week will be as great an attraction as is reported, he will wire to Commercial Club officials, and ask them to make arrangements with Sinnott to remain at the booth another week.

Exposition Is Marked by Miles of Movies

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 19.—The great moving picture feature of the Panama-Pacific International exposition distinguishes it from all other expositions in a most novel and interesting way. A survey of the field covered in the film offerings of the eighteen state and foreign buildings and palaces touches practically every field of human endeavor, bringing to the observer the life and customs, the industrial, agricultural and manufacturing pursuits of all nations and of all peoples.

More than 753,000 feet of reel tells the story of the world's work, and conveys its beauties to the visitor at the exposition. The pictures are free, for their purpose is purely educational. Each state and participating government has thus succeeded in giving an accurate idea of the industries and daily life of its people, the best features of its great cities, the fertility of its fields and the strength of its geographical position. The United States government has taken this means of showing the work of its many departments.

In the Palace of Machinery the dams of the Ohio River are shown, together with the uses of dynamite, lobster culture and Red Cross nursing. In the Palace of Agriculture one may see the operation of traction engines, plowing and dairy scenes, the bottling of milk and the making of good roads.

The great wine industry of America, showing its growth since the time of Don Caspar, is one of the interesting features in the Palace of Food Products. In the Liberal Arts Palace are pictures of the New York canal system, factory welfare work, reclamation work and geological survey activities.

Mining, from ore extraction to manufacture, may be studied in the silent films. Wire fencing, concrete making, steel mill operation, blast furnaces, the sardine industry, scenes in the wonderful Yosemite and the Panama canal are some of the pictures exhibited in the Palace of Mines.

The farmer will find a fertile field for study in the Livestock Department, where he may see the latest agricultural implements in operation, together with also construction, new methods of milk extraction and pictures of the last dairy show at Chicago. In the Palace of Transportation a series of tours are offered that will take the traveler anywhere his fancy dictates. He may go on the wings of the films to Chicago, to New York and to other great Eastern cities, seeing rural and urban life as it is. It takes three days and a half to run all the pictures in this building.

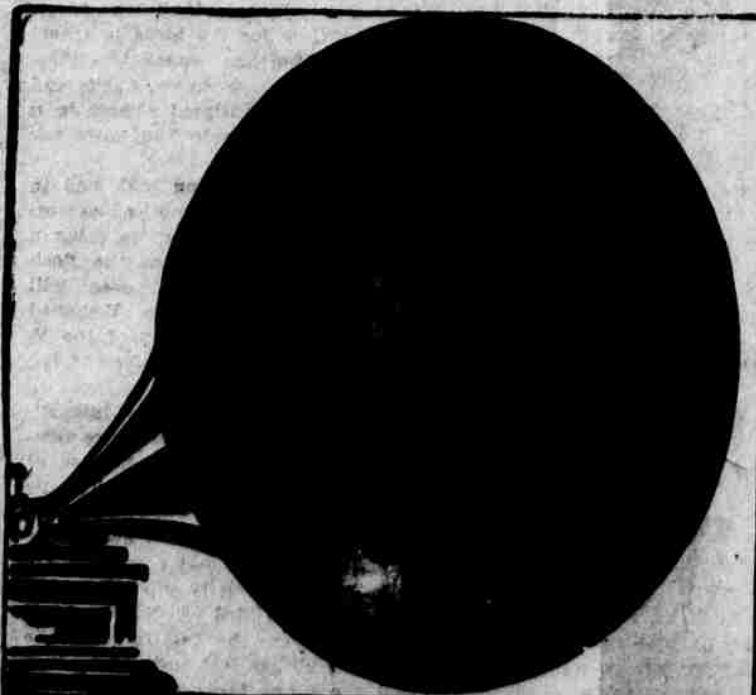

DIRECTOR OF BUREAU OF TUBERCULOSIS HAS PLAN FOR PROVIDING TREATMENT FOR POOR PLAGUE VICTIMS

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 20.—Miss Edith L. M. Tate of Los Angeles, who recently was appointed director of the state bureau of tuberculosis, said today that she hopes to have in working order within a year a plan by which any persons suffering from tuberculosis and without money can have care and treatment.
