**What the War Moves Mean**

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—The resignation of Sir Edward Carson as attorney general of England is, perhaps, the first step in the overthrow of the present government. This would be more certain if Great Britain had statesmen capable of succeeding the present cabinet members. But this is not the case. The greatest political minds are now included in the coalition government, and it is improbable that a ministry of superior talent could be organized.

Three men in Great Britain possess the characteristics of American energy and activity: Sir Edward Carson, Minister of Munitions Lloyd-George, and Lord Northcliffe.

Carson has just retired because he objects to the policy of muddling through the war; Lloyd-George recently warned his countrymen that they could only hope to win the war by using all their energies, and Lord Northcliffe has long been pessimistic regarding the government's methods. Their unanimity of judgment at this critical time suggests that Great Britain is drifting, if not defeated, then at least to a compromise peace.

**TWO GIRLS ELOPE PARENTS FORGIVE**

In Yreka the justice of the peace solemnized a double wedding.

Miss Neva Anderson, aged 18, became Mrs. John Flodin. Miss Stella became Mrs. Chris Thompson.

Today the two couples returned—still apprehensive as to what Mr. and Mrs. Anderson would think about it. But Mrs. Anderson had left word with Sheriff Low for them to come right out to the ranch to receive forgiveness and their parents' blessing, and partake of a wedding dinner.

**PLAN GOOD ROAD TO CRATER LAKE**

GEO. E. GOODWIN, ON WAY TO FAIR AFTER FINISHING WORK IN PARK, SAYS GOVERNMENT MONEY CAN BE SECURED

George E. Goodwin, who has been superintending the constructing of government roads in the Crater Lake national park, has finished the season's work. He was in Klamath Falls today on his way to San Francisco to visit the exposition. The engineers under him have mostly gone back to Portland.

While here he discussed with several Klamath county business men the necessity of rebuilding portions of the road between Klamath Falls and Crater Lake. Portions of the present road are not agreeable to motorists, and to make Crater Lake the resort it should be, better roads are necessary.

Mr. Goodwin said that an appropriation has been made by the United States government, through the department of Agriculture, to pay for the construction of roads of public benefit. Mr. Goodwin thought that if the business men of Klamath Falls would work together and prove to government officials that a road from Klamath Falls to the Crater Lake National park would be of public benefit, money for its construction could be secured.

**COLD EPIDEMIC STRIKES KLAMATH**

Private William Clarke of East Lancashire, in the hospital from wounds, is one of nine brothers enlisted, six of whom have been killed, two wounded, while the youngest is still in the trenches.

**SHERMAN COINED FAMOUS PHRASE**

SUCH IS FIRM BELIEF OF HIS SON—GENERAL SAID WAR WAS HELD IN ADDRESS TO MILITARY ACADEMY

PORTLAND, Oct. 21.—Regardless of the statements of some historians to the contrary, Rev. Thomas Edwin Sherman of St. Louis, son of General Sherman, is firm in the declaration that his distinguished father really did coin the world-famous epigram, "War is hell."

It was in the early '80's that General Sherman said, in an address before the graduating class of the cadets at a military school in Michigan. In an interview Rev. Sherman strongly advocated military and naval preparedness.

Rev. Sherman is in the Northwest looking over the country with a view of establishing colonies of Eastern city dwellers who want to get back to the soil.
