Cavell Execution Heightens War Spirit in England

ENGLISH RECRUIT MANY AS RESULT OF CAVELL DEATH

ENGLAND MOST ENRAGED SINCE BEGINNING OF WAR

Not Even Sappella Raids or Lusitania Sinking Quicker Recruiting as Much as Death of English Woman in Brussels at German Hands—Report Firing Squad Had Not Heart to Shoot, and Officer Killed Her.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—Recruiting officers say that no incident of the present war, not even the sinking of the Lusitania, or the Sappella raid, has caused recruiting as much as the execution of the English woman, Miss Cavell, by the Germans in Brussels.

WILSON OFFERS STERN MEASURES TO STOP RAIDS

AUTHORIZES WAR SECRETARY TO TAKE DRASTIC STEPS

Soldiers and Secret Service Officers Patrol Border—Situation is Acute, According to Official Admission. President Personally Directs Work to Stop Outlawry—Report American Executed by Villa.

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 22.—The embargo against the shipments of arms to and from Northern Mexico is in complete effect.

John Terry of Gladale, who has been working at Crater Lake, was brought to Dr. Hamilton's office yesterday with a broken leg. The bone was fractured in three places, all below the knee. The bone was set and Mr. Terry is at present at the hospital.

BULGARIANS AND TEUTONS HARASS SERBS; GAINING

BULGARS PENETRATE FAR INTO TERRITORY OF SERBIA

Must Be Driven Outward Before the Allies Can Aid Oppressed Country Against Teutons—German Raids Serbs Across River and Capture Town—Bulgars to Invade Serbian Bordering Province.

PARIS, Oct. 22.—It has been learned that the allies will permit the allies to use their troops and railroads in order to get through to Serbia. The war will not be long.

BERLIN, Oct. 22.—Germany is attempting to turn the German offensive left in the High Caucasus. The Russian warships shelled Dnepropetrovsk and neighboring towns of Polesia and Gipska.

BERLIN, Oct. 22.—It is announced that the Bulgarians captured Kopal and Kopalovo, in western Serbia. This information indicates that the Bulgarians are progressing steadily as these two towns are about 50 miles northwest of Belgrade.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—Press reports that the allies are advancing westward. It is evident that a battle is being fought there and the Bulgarians are preparing for the worst.

The allies must break the Bulgarian line and drive the Bulgarians westward before they can aid the Serbians against the Austrians.
