

NIGHT SCHOOL STARTS MONDAY

NIGHT SESSIONS IN COMMERCIAL
WORK WILL START AT EIGHT
SCHOOL MONDAY. EARNEST
WORK HOPED FOR

The Klamath County High School will open for night sessions in the commercial department on Monday evening, November 1st. The purpose of the evening work is to offer opportunity to those who are past high school age, or who are working during the day, or who for any other reason cannot attend the regular day sessions of the high school. Pupils attending day school will not be enrolled in night school except by special arrangement.

The courses as tentatively planned this year will cover a period of about ten weeks—three nights a week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The object will be to cover some definite course in the time given. If the registration is sufficiently large to justify it, the following subjects will be offered: bookkeeping, penmanship, typewriting, commercial arithmetic and rapid calculation, commercial correspondence, advertising and business English.

No student should register for more than two subjects, unless by special arrangement. Registration may be made any time before November 1st or on the evening of November 1st at the principal's office at the high school building. The evening sessions will begin at some hour which will suit the convenience of the majority of those enrolled.

Permanent results and definite ends can only be accomplished by persistent efforts and regular and punctual attendance in the short time allotted to the above courses, according to school officials. It is earnestly hoped that every one who registers will do so with the intention to be present at every session, and to do intensive work while the school lasts.

Those who wish to register or who desire additional information will call in person at the high school or will write or phone to the principal.

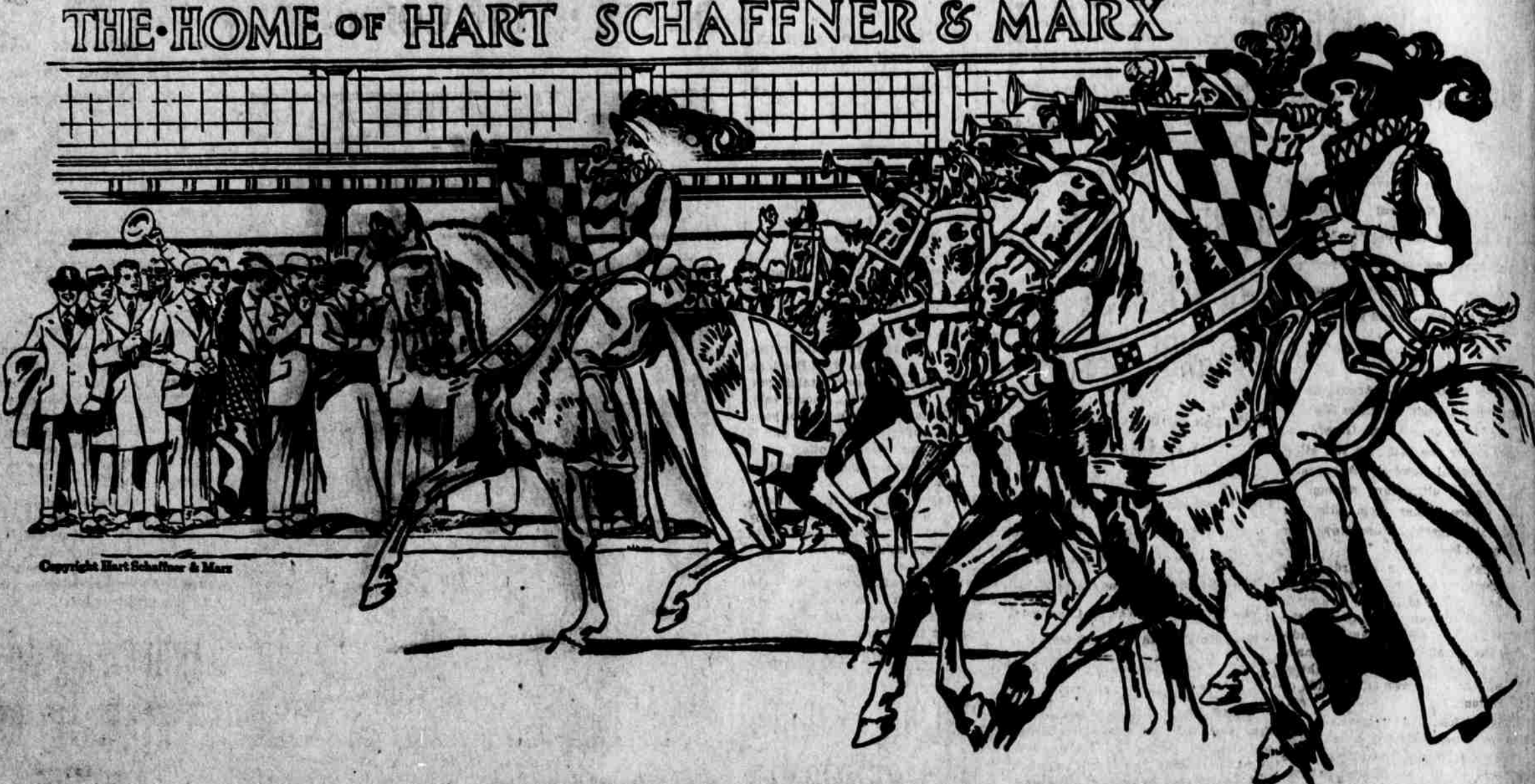

Facts of Interest to the Farmer

Owing to the lateness of the fall rains and the consequent delay in getting grain, vetches, etc., seeded, it will be necessary to take rather unusual precautions in order to get a sufficient stand of crop to produce a good yield next year. First, the seed should be very carefully graded and fanned in a good fanning mill and grain grader, in order to eliminate all small, shriveled, weak and damaged seed, as nothing but the large seed will germinate well at this late season after the soil has cooled off. All the wheat, oats, and barley seed should be treated for smut in order to eliminate any difficulty with that disease. The treatment should be made now, so that seeding will not be delayed at all when favorable weather comes.

Judging from results obtained in the county this year, and from the experience of farmers who have tried the wheat for several years, I feel safe

in stating that as a general rule winter wheat will prove most profitable on dry land and spring wheat most profitable on irrigated lands. There are exceptions to all general rules and this is stated as a general rule. The best varieties are still hard to choose. Judging from results obtained at our experiment stations, the Kharhof and Turkey Red wheats are the best varieties for fall planting. If a beardless wheat is preferred, the Fife wheats are to be recommended. The Early Beart and Marquis wheats are the best bearded and beardless varieties, respectively.

Deep storage of moisture, requisite to successful dry farming, can be secured only by keeping the surface soil in an absorptive, sponge-like condition, says Professor H. D. Sinden, O. A. C. agronomist. This should be continued as far as possible through the entire precipitation period, by good preparation of the soil. Plowing and disk and increasing the humus content of the soil are the chief means of keeping the surface conditions favorable, permitting the moisture to strike in both by penetration and cap-

illary attraction downward. If the surface soil is closely compacted during winter and early spring the surface water runs off, damaging the surface by washings and the subsoils by keeping them dry. Roots of crops grown on soils in this condition lack the moisture and feeding area to be secured in dry farming countries chiefly from deeply stored moisture.

MANY TRY FOR DUCKS SUNDAY

NORTHERN FLIGHT BEGINS, BUT
NOT IN FULL SWING—HUNTERS
MAKE A LAST TRY FOR THE
FRIEND VENISON

Hundreds of hunters gathered at the marshes Sunday to try their pro-

cess against the northern birds, the first flight of which has commenced. Saturday's bad weather brought them in to some extent, but bigger storms are necessary before the shooting will be first class.

The geese flight has begun, and in the Merrill and Tule Lake region hundreds of flocks are in evidence. A few local hunters succeeded in bagging some of these splendid birds Sunday.

Several good duck bags were secured, but most of the hunters complained that due to the bright weather the birds flew too high—almost out of gun range.

This is the last week of the deer season, and the deer hunters who have not been successful in securing their winter store of venison will start forth this week for a last try. Saturday's rain, though comparatively light in Klamath Falls, was heavy in the hills, which, of course, facilitates deer hunting.
