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Big Negro Tells Graphic Story of Big Battle

PARIS, Oct. 8.—(By mail to New York)—The foreign legion's American contingent was nearly wiped out in the great Champagne advance. One of the few who came out whole was John Frederick Brown, ordinarily known as "Nigger John" of Boston, Mass. I saw John in the hospital.

"Where were you wounded, John?" I asked.

"I ain't wounded," grinned John. "I've just par'ized. We was goin' up a slope with all kinds of things comin' down at us, an' a great big German Jack Johnson hit me right in the middle of the back, an' lawzey me, mistah I sho' thought ma' days was over."

The white robed nurse explained that John's back was bruised and his legs were probably temporarily dead.

John used to work for an automobile house around Warren and Tremont streets, Boston, and it seemed such a long way to the Champagne battlefield that I asked him why he joined the legion.

"Lawzey me, man," said John, through a perpetual smile that showed his white teeth. "I guess I allus did have mo' curiosity than intelligence."

"Still, you saw the big battle; that was worth something," I suggested.

"You bet it was something," John said. "When I left Paris we went to the Vosges first. Then they sent us to Champagne for the big mill. We

started in to fight from a place just north of Swipes (Sulipes). That Saturday mornin' we started off close formation like Germans, and we was all mighty worried, because if anyone of them shells hit us—it would-a wiped out the whole company. But after a while the officer ordered us to spread out, and we sho' did obey. For comin' down that hill there was a whole arsenal full of machine bullets, rifle bullets, cannon balls, chunks of dirt, an' everything. Ever' once in a while we'd entrench and then got up and run forward. When we got to the top of the hills the Germans got skeered an' bent backward. We kept after 'em till finally we got caught in a pocket with machine guns in front of us and on both sides, and shells burstin' in the middle.

"That's where I got mine. They told us to lie down flat, and keep under them mitrailleur bullets—that is what the French call a machine gun—but I jest wanted say you simply can't duck 'em bullets; they seem to kinder hop, skip an' jump along the ground. When that Jack Johnson hit me in the back, O Lawdy, I said to mahself, I guess I's earning that cent a day all right—now. But the futuh looks mighty da'k."

"In the legion," said John, "they have all sorts of charms to bring good luck, but I reckon the left hin' foot of a graveyard rabbit is about the best o' all."

"What makes you think so?" I asked.

"I'm heah, ain't I?"
