# Yoshihito Is Finally Made Nippon Ruler

CORONATION CEREMONIES IN PROGRESS FOR THE PAST SIX WEEKS COME TO A CLOSE TODAY WITH THE FINAL ACCESSION—FOR FIRST TIME FOREIGNERS SEE THE JAPANESE RAISE PRINCE TO EMPEROR'S THRONE

(United Press Staff Correspondent)

KYOTO, Japan, Nov. 10.—Emperor Yoshihito's coronation here today was the first coronation in twenty-five centuries that representatives of the people have been permitted to attend. The Japanese people are greatly pleased.

Today's rather simple and brief ceremony, marking the accession of Yoshihito to the place handed down "by divine right" from his forefathers who were emperors "before the dawn of history," is the climax of the six-weeks' accession program for which the Diet appropriated \$2,000,000.

Members of the court, ministers of state, members of the diplomatic corps and members of the Diet, representing the people, attired in the gorgeous silver and golden ceremonial robes of the ancients, were nowhere to be seen when the foreign representatives were herded to their seats before the imperial scarlet canopy to the sound of flutes and drums, hidden in Shunkyo-den Temple.

It may be several hours before the signal will be given and the doors of the sanctuary, where the jewel, the sword and the mirror are kept, are opened and the offering spread be-

fore the altar. Then will enter the emperor, followed by the Princes of the Blood, ministers and coronation commissioners. After a brief silence the emperor will read an address to the gathered spirits of his dead ancestors, telling them he has assumed the place they left for him.

Then at the coronation they will do homage to the new emperor and he will sit down upon the seat of "The Son of Heaven." Later he will publicly proclaim his accession to his subjects generally. Days of feasting and celebration will follow the ceremony proper of today.

## OREGON BUILDING FOR THIS CITY

SAN FRANCISCO FIRM SUGGESTS IT, AND OFFERS TO DONATE \$300—IF THEY CAN RAISE THE STRUCTURE

It's happened at last.

There is hardly a city in Oregon but what has had a little campaign on to have the Oregon building at the exposition moved to that city and erected at some prominent spot. The matter has been broached in Klamath Falls, not by local parties, but by Gutleben Bros., San Francisco contractors, and the Commercial Club has received the following from the firm:

"You doubtless know that the Oregon building at the exposition at San Francisco is one of the best constructed and grandest buildings on the grounds. The architecture is very beautiful, as it is modeled after the Theseum, one of the best of the Greek temples in Athens.

"Klamath Falls should secure this building, and erect it on one of its hills. By prompt and vigorous action, you could probably get the state of Oregon to give it to you as it stands, and possibly pay something toward the removing as well. The railroads may be persuaded to transport it without cost to Klamath Falls. Some of your public-spirited citizens might pay to have it erected on its arrival at Klamath Falls.

"If you could arrange to finance the enterprise, the writer will personally contribute \$300. He will also have his company agree to take down the present building at exact cost."

It is hardly possible that the matter will be given any attention by the directors, as the proposition looks like some lively campaigning on the part of the firm to get the contract for wrecking the building.

The Oregon building, built on mas-

sive lines, with its impressive log columns, was erected in a substantial manner, being the only permanent building on the fair grounds. The disposition of the building has not been decided upon as yet, but as its site is on the Presidio reservation it is more than likely that the building will be donated to the government as an assembly hall or club room for the officers or soldiers quartered on the military reserve.

### WILL WAR END TOMORROW?

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—The European war will end tomorrow, says a postcard from a German in the Vosges. "Germany's last great war was in 1870-1871. Peace was concluded May 10, 1871. Add 1870 to 1871 and you get 3,741. Add the first two figures, 3 and 7, and you get 10. Add the last two and you get 5, meaning—10-5-71.  
"This war has been in 1914-1915. Add 1914 to 1915 and you get 3,829. Add the first two figures and you get 11. Add the last two and you get 11, meaning that peace will come on 11-11-16.

### LABORITES ARE TALKING LAWS

MEASURES FOR BETTERMENT OF WORKERS TO BE ASKED FROM CONGRESS ARE DISCUSSED AT EXPOSITION

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.—Legislation in the interest of labor, which will be asked of the next congress, was discussed by delegates at the big convention of The American Federation of Labor here today.

The executive council of the federation made many recommendations in its report and many others were made in resolutions by delegates at the earlier sessions.

Practically all the bills which failed of passage in the last congress will be re-introduced at the coming session and lobbied for by the council.

The fight which organized labor has made upon convict and child labor, will be continued. The heads of the federation believe that by prohibiting the interstate shipment of goods made by convicts or children, these manufacturers will cease.

Both convict labor bills were passed by the house in the last session and favorably reported to the senate, where they failed. The Owens-Palmer child labor bill also passed the house but died in the senate.

"We are confident that a measure similar to the Owens-Palmer bill will become a law in the near future because we believe that congress is not inclined to set itself against the enlightened public sentiment in behalf of better opportunities for children," declared one federation official.

Old age pensions for government employees is a subject in which the federation is interested, but no legislation, it is thought, will be introduced until the employees themselves reach an agreement on the sort of a program they wish passed. The federation also approves suffrage for the citizens of the District of Columbia, but officials declared they would take no legislative action until residents of the district showed some sort of united desire for the vote.

The federation feels that the war has caused a near panic in the United States by unemployed, has made radical changes in American industrialism, has brought a near crisis for labor in the suggested embargo on exportations, has been the cause of attempts to stir up industrial disputes and has caused to be postponed the meeting of the International Federation of Trade Unions. The federation was asked to take action which will lead to the forming of closer bonds between the workers of all countries and the quick healing of the wounds of conflict. The federation will form a plan for a great labor congress for permanent peace, to be held in this country at the close of the present war.

# Tule Lake Land Is Now Ready for Use

(Continued from page 3)

bids will receive sealed bids for the leasing of uncovered lands along Tule Lake until 1 o'clock p. m., November 18, 1915. Successful bidders will be required to enter into a lease for a period of three years.

Payments for the rental must be made annually in advance, the first payment to be made on or before January 1, 1916, the second on or before March 1, 1917, and the third on or before March 1, 1918.

Not more than 80 acres will be leased to any one person or family, including similar lands under prior lease. The land must be cultivated to crop each year, or put into tame grass meadow. Water will be furnished for irrigation on a rental basis at the rate of \$1 per acre foot, delivered at the most practical point on established canals in the First Unit.

Payment for water must be made in advance, and the lessee must build his own ditches from the point of delivery.

Maps showing the land divided into numbered lots, with acreage in each lot, will be posted at the postoffice of

Malin, Oregon; Merrill, Oregon, and at the United States reclamation service office, Klamath Falls, Oregon.

The proposals will provide for the bidding on first, second and third choice of lots, giving each bidder three chances to secure a tract of land.

It is required that the bids must be uniform for each acre per year for the three year period. No money is required to be sent with the bid. Successful bidders will be notified, and must then sign a lease and pay the first year's rental before January 1, 1916, or the land will be re-advertised and leased to the highest bidder.

Blank forms for bids may be secured at the postoffice at Malin and Merrill or at the reclamation office at Klamath Falls. A copy of the lease may be obtained from the United States reclamation service, Klamath Falls, Oregon.

All proposals should be marked on the outside of the envelope, "Proposal to lease Tule Lake Land." Successful bidders may commence work on the land as soon as notified that their bid is accepted.
