Trip to Europe Makes Mooser a Wilson Aide

RED HEADED KANSAN SAYS HE IS ASTOUNDED WITH EXTENT OF THE MILITARY EQUIPMENT OF GREAT BRITAIN, AND IS CONVINCED THAT PREPAREDNESS OF UNITED STATES IS HIGHLY ESSENTIAL

LONDON, Nov. 30.—A sure cure for anti-preparedness views is a visit to Europe, according to the description of Victor Murdock, former American bull moose congressman.

"I have been in England three days and I must say I am astounded at the extent of Great Britain's present military equipment and the people's evident determination to win the war at any cost," he told me.

"Coming fresh from the United States, where peace talk is uppermost, I am strongly impressed by the utter futility of such propaganda. I find only indignation in both high and low quarters at any American attempt to force a conclusion of the hostilities."

He admitted that he feared Majority Leader Kitchin and anti-Wilson democrats may succeed in defeating the Wilson preparedness program.

"They would be converted," he added, "if they could see the situation in England and hear everyone's convictions that unpreparedness alone is responsible for the allies' reverses early in the war, while Germany's preparation won."

Definition of "Unfair Competition" Stumps 'Em

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 30.—

"What is unfair competition?"

The federal trade commission, after months of trying to find out, is about where it began on that question. Ask a member what is unfair competition, he'll parry with the plea that you ask him about some individual case. Complaints to the commission show that every sort of competition which can't be met seems unfair to the man who can't meet it; and the defenses offered indicate that anything goes in the rough and tumble game of business. In the new cafeteria stores in some

places in the East, a man may go in, help himself, and be checked out at the door. That makes it possible, say the merchants, to sell a 15-cent article for 13 cents. Grocers brand such competition unfair.

Or take the chain stores, buying in large quantities at cut prices, even on standard articles. Ordinary retailers launch and rave considerably when they write the commission about these establishments. They tell about the big concern which sells a 20-cent article for 15 cents in one town and for 25 cents in another, to crowd out a competitor in the 15-cent district.

"We're big, and entitled to take advantage of our bigness," such concerns tell the commission.

Then there's the man who finds that someone is imitating his first class goods and selling slightly under his price; the man who makes a standard article and cannot keep some retailers from knocking a cent or two off its price to attract other trade.

There have been approximately 100 types of complaint filed, ranging in merit from what the commission considers merely a case of more efficient business conduct, to a number of cases of downright skulduggery. There are state court decisions on many cases, so that what is not fair in one state is O. K. in another.

Wherefore the invitation. If anyone thinks he knows what is unfair competition, will he kindly drop a line or two to the commission?

LANDLORDISM IS RUINING FARMS

SO, AT ANY RATE, SAYS SECRETARY OF NATIONAL FARM CREDITS AND MARKETING CONFERENCE AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—"The gradual tendency of this country is toward landlord ownership of land," Charles W. Holman, secretary, today told the third national conference on marketing and farm credits. "The condition is threatening to become almost as complicated as during feudal times," Holman continued. "Men live in luxury in cities with money made with the labor of tenants. The condition is leading this country to an unfortunate economic condition—almost as unfortunate as the condition from which Ireland was just pulled."

More than 700 delegates, representing thirty-eight states, were in attendance at the second day's session today. The conference will end Thursday evening.

Standardization of farm products as to quality and size and type of products is necessary as an accurate basis of price quotations, Charles J. Brand, chief of the bureau of markets of the Department of Agriculture, told the conference. He said accuracy of standards in selling products means a smaller margin between the price paid by the customer and the price paid by the producer. Poor qualities and ungraded products are ruinous to the whole market, he said. Failure to standardize packages, he said, afforded opportunity for dishonesty. That standardization of containers is a proper subject for federal legislation, was his contention.

RANGER SIGHTS TIMBER WOLVES

FOREST RANGER STATIONED ON CHERRY CREEK REPORTS HAVING SEEN AS MANY AS FIVE TIMBER WOLVES NEAR BY

Not many years ago it was no uncommon thing to have a neighbor drop in and tell of an experience with timber wolves. Nowadays, to see them is somewhat remarkable. While policing his territory as a

government ranger in the vicinity of Cherry Creek recently, Frank Carlson suddenly came upon the carcass of a freshly killed deer, and from signs and indications a band of five animals had been feeding upon the animal.

These wolves are creatures of ferocious nature, and when it comes to a pitched battle, there is hardly an animal that roams the woods its equal. They are strong and sinewy, with teeth as sharp as needles, a gnash from which would sever the flesh like the blade of a sharp knife.

A full grown timber wolf will measure in the neighborhood of five feet in length, and stand about thirty inches high, and have a drooping, bushy tail harmonizing in color with the remainder of their body, of which the prevailing tone is gray. Most animals are an easy prey to these creatures, as they travel from twenty-five to forty miles in a night.
