# OUR WEEKLY SERMON

## "Life Conquests"

By Rev. E. C. Richards, Pastor Grace M. E. Church

"The Lamb slain from the foundation of the world."—Rev. 13:8.

**1—Contrasts.**  
The child which you fondle in your arms today is the product of a new era. It is interesting and helpful to note some of the conditions that he will meet—the things he will not have to fight against and the things he will have to meet in contest. His privations and temptations as compared with ours will be limited. He will never know what it is not to be able to whisper to wife or mother across a continent. He can receive a death message or send a birth greeting across seas in an instant. He will never know a time when men could not fly in the air or ride secure beneath the waves. He will never know a time when one could not heat, light and glorify the home by turning a switch. Poor cooking, filth in the home and serious menace from disease there will be unknown to him. Smallpox, diphtheria, yellow fever, typhoid, will have no terrors for him. The temptation of the saloon and its liquor fumes will be unknown to him. And, may it please God, war with its horrors will be to him like ancient history.

But there are some things he must meet and fight against. The battles of the soul will remain unchanged except in form. He must grapple with himself. Like Hall Caine's thrall, he will discover himself in the night shades, and pursuing the form and grappling with it will, bending over his knee in victory, discover as the light shines in the face, that the face of the thrall is his own face. Temptations to dishonesty, greed, envy, passion, discouragement, doubt, will sweep like tempests over his soul like they have swept over yours. Most of the men who have tried to live right and who have sought high ideals have fallen in some ways. Moses in his wisdom falling beneath anger; David with his song falling beneath lust; Solomon in his wisdom falling beneath splendor; Elijah with his bravery falling before fear—these are types of the soul in battle striving for a higher life. The religious life is the attempt of a man to transform his life motives into newer and better

types and to realize from them high values in the soul. If there is a man who never fails let him be translated with Enoch.  
So your son will need an—

**2—Atonement.**  
Your son will need a great Savior. If he can be great enough to fight out his battle alone and yet not alone; if he can learn to conquer his nature and at the same time to lean upon an atoning Christ, he is safe. The soul, storm tossed and tempest beaten, needs a higher consoling life. Some are discouraged because the ideal of feeling is not realized; others because confidence is not always pressing across results do not come when expected; others just because they are not tempted. But we forget that religion, like civilization itself, is not a perfected thing. Neither is it a mechanical device. It is not beauty in sculptured stone needing no further touch. We are not playing a perfected instrument and the music itself has never come up to the perfect scroll. We experiment and improve the instrument. We are creators of eternal harps. We are perfecting a music to be sung before eternal courts, and to stir raptures in God images. We are commissioned to be masters of time and conquerors of eternity.

The text speaks of the "Lamb slain from the foundation of the world." What is it? A God thought in human flesh. A God thought older than men. A creative power. A ransoming grip upon men. A transforming touch. A sympathy put in form so that men can see it. An everlasting holding to a purpose. A sun ray through driving clouds. A heart big enough to take in the bruised, the sick, the failed ones. Meekness which is the embodiment of strength. Yielding which is the expression of majesty. A messenger from God to bring at-one-ment with men. Atonement. The foundation of the earth is in him. The goal of men is with him. He masters himself and his age. He makes all ages his. His gaze is forward, not backward. He looks up, not down.

Your boy, escaped from much, will still be in struggle. He will need a Savior.

Lang Syne. High above this scene, in his illuminated aeroplane, Art Smith will streak: "Farewell, P. P. I. E." in letters of fire across the sky.

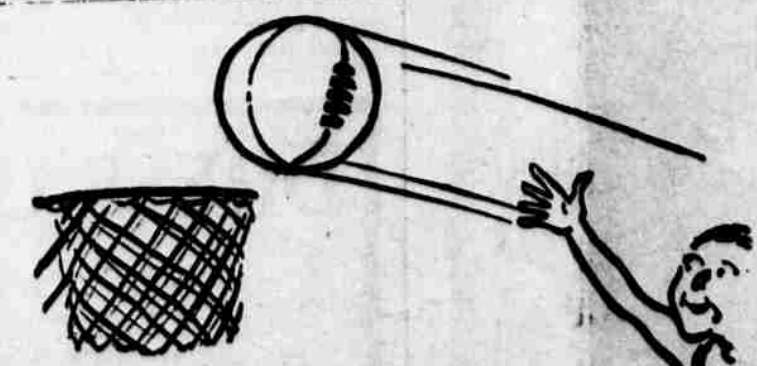
Then the Panama-Pacific exposition will be history.

As celebrating the Wedding of the Waters through the Panama canal, the exposition surpassed all expectations. By November 15th more than 16,500,000 people had visited the big display. Fifteen million visitors by that date had been considered a liberal estimate. The fair also has been

a financial success. Figures made public today show a net return of nearly \$1,500,000.
