ROADS IN OREGON

OREGON has over 37,000 miles road presided over by 878 road supervisors, many of whom, it is fair to assume, are not trained road builders. In ten years ending with 1914 these men have spent nearly \$21,500,000, or an average of nearly \$2,150,000 per year. This annual expenditure has grown until in 1915 it is approximately \$4,000,000. The probability is that it will continue to increase until it has reached a very much larger sum.

There are few, if any, lines of public endeavor which call for so great an expenditure of the public money. There can be no question that the entire state is interested in getting the greatest possible return from this expenditure.

WITH THE ESTIMATED federal expenditure for the next fiscal year over \$167,000,000 greater than the present, it looks as though the democratic economy is as noticeable in government circles as it is in private business circles—where it can't be noticed at all.

WE ALL CANNOT agree on the practicability of the peace plans of Henry Ford and Pope Benedict, but we all at least hand it to them for having the courage to back their convictions with actions. And at a time when every new move in Europe is a new nation involved in the maelstrom, a peace effort, even though unavailing, sounds a sweet, humanitarian note above the din of battle.

COTTON FAMINE AFTER THE WAR

SUCH IS PREDICTION MADE BY BRITISH SAVANT, IN URGING THE DEVELOPMENT OF BRITISH COLONIAL FIELDS

LONDON, Dec. 1.—(By mail)—A world wide cotton famine will follow the close of the war, according to Professor John A. Todd, department of economics, University College, Nottingham. He urges Great Britain to develop new fields in India, Egypt and the Sudan. He reasons that the temporary fall in prices at the beginning of the war curtailed cotton promotion and that the renewed demand at the close of the war, combined with a short acreage, will cause the famine. Russia, he says, has shown her wisdom in developing cotton fields in Turkestan and Trans-Caucasia, which adequately supply her. Germany has done the same thing in the Levant, to a certain extent. Both the quality and quantity of cotton for Great Britain can be added to in India, Egypt and the Sudan, he says, adding that cotton growing is a good business to get into now.

tion, granting right of nationwide suffrage to women.
Prohibition—Dry amendment to federal constitution and a dry District of Columbia.
Railroads—Extension of government control with possibly ultimate supervision of securities. Increased powers for Interstate Commerce Commission. Train safety bill compelling use of steel cars, block signals and other life saving devices.
Telegraphs and Telephones—Government condemnation and operation of all such lines.
Finance—Rural land credits and personal rural credits. National budget system, with new system of house supervision. May abolish the comptroller of the currency.
Treaties—Ratify those with Colombia, Nicaragua and Hayti, paying Colombia \$25,000,000 as result of Panama canal acquisition; \$3,000,000 to Nicaragua for exclusive rights to canal route, and establishing a ten-year American protectorate over Hayti.
Presidential Terms—Limiting president's tenure to one term of either four or six years.
Primary Elections—Presidential primaries and abolition of party conventions for all purposes except the drafting of party platforms and nominee ratifications.
Immigration—Literary tests for immigrants and also the exclusion of Asiatics.
Closures—Prevent senate filibustering by rules limiting debate on any given subject.
Philippine and Porto Rican Independence—Providing both self-government in given time.

OPENING OF 64TH CONGRESS BRINGS OUT RESOLUTIONS

CHAMP CLARK AGAIN NAMED AS SPEAKER

Formal Opening of Congress Occurred Today Without a Hitch—Many Stormy Meetings Are in Prospect, Owing to Division of Sentiment Among Solons as to the Merits of Administration Measures.

the last congressional meeting before the 1916 presidential campaign. All 435 members of the house and 32 senators (one-third of the whole senate) were sworn in. Of the former 116 and of the latter nine were new. Resting upon the legislative program of the new congress today was the shadow of national and world politics. Tomorrow the administration's program will be outlined personally by President Wilson when he reads his opening message at the joint session. Its known, big, outstanding features are: National defense, revenue, war measures and government ship purchase.

There is a mass of other legislation comprising the largest, longest and most important program of a decade. Since the adjournment of the sixty-third congress last March a score of new and vital questions have arisen in addition to many left over. Continuation of this session until well into next summer is predicted by veteran legislators.

There were the usual mammoth crowds in both senate and house galleries, representing the eyes of a hundred million Americans. Today's actual business was confined to the routine of swearing in new members, organization of both houses and notification of the president of the new legislative epoch.

As the gavel fell at the stroke of twelve at both ends of the Capitol, officials and spectators were sobered by the gigantic tasks looming ahead. Vice President Marshall presided in the senate, and South Trimble, house clerk, in the lower house, pending Speaker Clark's election. After the routine tasks both bodies adjourned until tomorrow to await the president's message, according to ancient and legal precedent.

As completed today, the result of congressional elections in November, 1914, the democratic majority in the senate was increased from 13 to 16. In the house it was reduced from 143 to 135. The new senate lineup today was: Democrats 56, republicans 40. The new house: Democrats 230, republicans 196, progressives 7, socialists 1, independents 1. The last house had 236 democrats, 125 republicans, 17 progressives and one independent. For the first time since the sixty-second congress the socialist party was again represented today, Meyer London of New York being the member.

Re-election of President Wilson and continued democratic control of the nation's destinies was conceded by most legislators to hang upon the results of this session. Political Herald want ads get results.
