Rural Credit Legislation Is Urged at Big Congress

(United Press Correspondent)

CHARLESTON, S. C., Dec. 13.—Nine billion dollars is the price American farmers get for their crops every year, while enough is added by middlemen so that the consumers pay \$27,000,000 for the same crop, according to the statement of rural crediting and marketing experts before the Southern Commercial Congress, which opened here today. The House of Southern Governors also began a five days meeting. Cotton, credits and commerce will be the big subjects most discussed by both bodies. Peace and prosperity also will have place on the program.

Members of the congress were told by speakers favoring rural credit legislation that the farmer gets 35 cents and the middleman 65 cents of each dollar the consumer pays for the farmers' crops. There is an enormous amount of waste, especially in perishable products, because of the lack of a central directing market intelligence, they said.

The delegates were welcomed by Mayor John P. Grace of Charleston, R. G. Rhett, president of the Chamber of Commerce, and Richard I. Manning, governor of South Carolina. Senator Duncan U. Fletcher of Florida, president of the congress, read his annual address. John Barnett, director of the Pan-American Union, also spoke.

Miss Louise G. Lindsey of Nashville, president of the Women's Auxiliary, opened the meeting of that organization this afternoon. Mrs. Julia Heath, New York, president of the National Housewives' League, Miss Kate Gordon, New Orleans, Mrs. John Epperson and Mrs. Rutledge Smith, Tennessee, Mrs. D. A. McDougal, Oklahoma, and other prominent Southern women, also spoke.

Tonight Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler of Columbia University, New York, will speak on "The Changed Outlook," and a number of Southern governors will join in an informal discussion of "Cotton, Commerce and Rural Credits."

The executives were invited here by Governor Manning of South Carolina for the purpose of organizing the House of Southern Governors. "The governors at this and subsequent

meetings will discuss problems of legislation and law enforcement of importance to the South," said Dr. C. J. Owen of the congress.

Other features of the program for the seventh annual convention of the Southern Commercial Congress are: Mobilization of the Atlantic fleet, by order of the Secretary of the Navy; Mobilization of the National Guard of South Carolina, Conference of Southern Cotton Congress, Conference of National Drainage Congress, Conference of Southern Commercial Secretaries, Rural Credits conference under personal guidance of David Lubin, American Delegate to the International Institute of Agriculture, in Rome, Italy; Conference of League to Enforce Peace, of which ex-President Taft is President, to be presided over by President Lowell of Harvard; Conference on Commercial Education in Relation to Foreign and Domestic Commerce, to be presided over by Dr. Glen Levin Swigott, assistant secretary general of the International Scientific Congress; Meeting of the American Commission on Agricultural Organization, United States Commission on Rural Credits and the National Marketing Committee, the three organizations called to meet in Charleston by Senator Duncan U. Fletcher, chairman of all three bodies, and a conference on Agricultural Immigration and Labor, called by Wm. B. Wilson, Secretary of Labor.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—Indications are that the allies' general war council is meeting with the common fate of coalitions, and is falling to satisfy. Persistent reports from Paris report serious differences of opinion among the military leaders. In fact, the council is proving itself no grand general staff for direction of the war, but instead an exchange bureau for examination of policies. The council now is engaged in examining the advisability of continuing the Balkan campaign. Meantime, British and French forces are being hurled back from southern Serbia.

This examination into the Balkan problem, however, is not a matter of determining how to defeat the Teutons and Bulgars, but rather what is good for the individual allies. A truly united policy, acceptable to all the allies is impossible. Russia wants the Balkan situation continued for the sake of her prestige in that region, while the other allies are not entirely content with continuing on and neglecting possibilities of another major offensive in the west. Britain takes a leading part in opposition to Russia's desire to have the Balkan campaign continue at all costs. Italy is reluctant to contribute men as long as the central allies keep out of Albania, the territory on which she keeps her jealous eye. At the same time, France wants to reserve her forces for her own defense. A compromise, therefore, would leave misgivings, if not actual suspicion among the contending groups. Each one of the allies, however, can not oppose Russia with an easy mind, for despite her agreements will all the other entente powers, she might make a separate peace if thwarted in her Balkan desires, and this would be a serious blow to the ambitions of the entente.

British casualty lists published during November total 1,283 officers and 45,124 non-commissioned officers and men in all fields of war, bringing the total since the beginning of hostilities up to approximately 600,000.
