

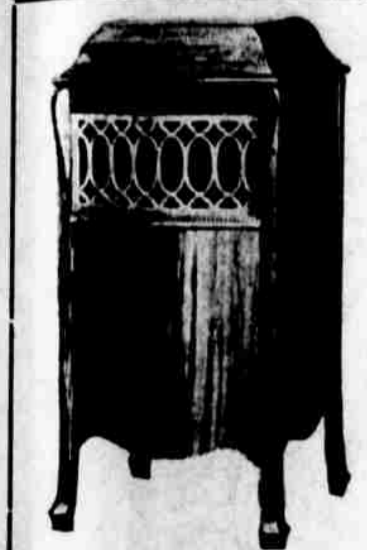

What did the kaiser say? That's what official Washington would like to know. Albert J. Beveridge, schooled in statecraft through years of membership on the foreign relations committee of the United States senate, talked with Emperor Wilhelm II. for two hours. But not a single word of what was said is known. American state department officials would like to know what the kaiser said. He may have said much that might guide Secretary Lansing. The Indiana statesman, confidante of American diplomats and presidents, interviewed other leaders in the great conflict, whose word has often meant war or peace. These important interviews he has just published in a book he calls "What Is Back of the War?" The book is just off the press, but it is already in the archives of the state department, and is considered a most notable document of "inside information."

activities, and General von Hindenburg, the hero of the eastern battlefields, are two of the men who told their opinions regarding the war to Beveridge. But what the kaiser said in Beveridge's two hours' talk with him—the book falls to state. Beveridge's information, besides being data he gathered in Germany and in the German trenches, also tells of the other side. He visited the French and British troops in the trenches, and interviewed the men of might in both France and Great Britain.
