THE HOUSE WE LIVE IN

THE part that environment plays in determining the life of man always has been recognized as important. Within the term environment are comprehended many elements, both natural and artificial. In general during the formative stage of existence we can do little of ourselves to alter our natural environment; in fact, at that stage we can do little to change our artificial environment, that being entirely within the power of others, our parents especially.

Unquestionably there are wide differences in the influence exerted upon the individual man by natural environments—the sea, the plains, the mountains and other natural wonders; but they have more to do with his mental or intellectual constitution than with his physical being. Yet his intellectual staminal, if not his mental traits, is powerfully influenced and affected by his artificial environment indirectly through their influence upon his physical condition. That is to say, if he has a sane mind at birth, it will be made more secure in a sound body.

Somebody has said that the child must first be a good animal; which is, of course, only a harsh way of saying that his parents owe their first duty to their offspring as an animal—they must do all within their power to give him a good start in life along the road to health.

From the cradle to the grave most potent influences in securing and perpetuating health are fresh air and sunshine. Hence, well ventilated and well lighted houses are a prerequisite to bodily health, and though these are more readily accessible to the rural resident than to the city denizen, the former has generally placed less value upon them and taken less pains to secure them for himself and his family than has the latter.

The time will come when in the rural communities the relation of home architecture to health will be more generally appreciated than it is at present. When that time comes windows open top and bottom, the sleeping porch, the screened in porch, the bath rooms and the indoor sanitary closet will have places in all dwelling house plans, and the farmer who omits or disregards them will stand low in the esteem of his fellows.

LETTER WEEK IS SET FOR JANUARY

ALL ARE ASKED TO WRITE AT LEAST TEN LETTERS TO THEIR FRIENDS IN THE EAST, TELLING THEM ABOUT OREGON

The Portland Chamber of Commerce has invited all Oregon civic and business organizations to undertake a great movement for the purpose of interesting tourist travel to Oregon and the Northwest in 1916.

To secure a maximum of success the movement must have the co-operation of every organization within the state. This is an all-Oregon proposition.

It is to be known as Letter Writing Week, beginning January 17th and ending January 22d. From Portland alone it is figured that two million letters will be sent out during those six days. Every merchant will be asked to write fifty letters to Eastern business men, friends and relatives; every citizen will be asked to write at least ten letters, addressing them to sections throughout the East, South and North. In Portland these letters will be gathered at noon each day and deposited in a mammoth letter box on the street, and photographs of the great heap of letters will be taken at the conclusion of the week.

The movement is receiving unbounded support. A great meeting will be held in Portland on the night of January 5th to work out further plans for making this a bigger and better success than is even indicated in these lines.

American Rejoinder to Austria Makes Our Position Very Clear

In Message Delivered to Austrian Officials in Vienna This Afternoon, Austria Is Told America Will Not Argue, But Will Expect Reparation

POINTS OF AMERICA'S ANCONA REJOINDER

By the Austrian admiralty's own admission that its commander torpedoed the Ancona after her engines stopped and passengers were still aboard, Austria violated international law and "entirely disregarded" the humane principles which should govern sea warfare, in America's view. Details of the sinking and the matter of who perished, as sought by Austria, are hence "in no way essential" matters of discussion. The commander's culpability, in any case established. Americans were put in jeopardy by his lawless act. The administration holds Austria does not question or dispute recognized international law nor humane principles, so the United States does not feel called upon to debate them. America renews the demands of her original note and "sincerely hopes" Austria will meet them in a spirit of frankness and with "the same concern for good relations" now existing between the nations in which the United States makes the demands.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 22.—The United States will not argue with Austria any points involved in the sinking of the Ancona.

In the second American note to Vienna, made public by the state department today when it was delivered to Foreign Minister Burián in Vienna, this government states that it must "renew the definite but respectful demands made in its communication of the 6th of December."

This second note, extremely brief, is friendly in tone, but leaves no doubt of the determination that Austria shall make full reparation for American lives lost, and shall punish the Aus-

trian commander whose "culpability is in any case established," and whose act, details of which were given in the Austrian admiralty statement, is held to be "wilful violation of the rules of international law and the principles of humanity."

Addressed to Ambassador Penfield, the note follows:

"Department of State, Washington, December 19, 1915—You are instructed to address a note to the Austro-Hungarian minister of foreign affairs, textually as follows:

"The government of the United States has received the note of your excellency relative to the sinking of the Ancona, which was delivered at

Vienna on December 15, 1915, and transmitted to Washington, and has given the note immediate and careful consideration.

"On November 15, 1915, Baron Zwiédinek, the charge d'affaires of the imperial and royal government at Washington, transmitted to the department of state a report of the Austro-Hungarian admiralty with regard to the sinking of the steamship Ancona, in which it was admitted that the vessel was torpedoed after her engines had been stopped and when passengers were still on board. This admission alone is, in view of the United States, sufficient to fix upon the commander of the submarine which fired the torpedo, the responsibility for having wilfully violated the recognized law of nations and entirely disregarded those humane principles which every belligerent should observe in the conduct of war at sea. In view of these admitted circumstances the government of the United States feels justified in holding that the details of the sinking of the Ancona, the weight and character of the additional testimony corroborating the admiralty's report and the number of Americans killed or injured are in no way essential matters of discussion. The culpability of the commander is in any case established, and the undisputed fact is that citizens of the United States were killed, injured, or put in jeopardy by this lawless act.

"The rules of international law and the principles of humanity which were thus wilfully violated by the commander of the submarine have been so long and so universally recognized and are so manifest from the standpoint of right and justice that the government of the United States does not feel called upon to debate them and does not understand that the imperial and royal government questions or disputes them.

"The government of the United States therefore finds no other course open to it but to hold the imperial and royal government responsible for the act of its naval commander and to renew the definite but respectful demands made in its communication of the 6th of December, 1915. It sincerely hopes that the foregoing statement of its position will enable the imperial and royal government to perceive the justice of those demands and to comply with them in the same spirit of frankness and with the same concern for the good relations now existing between the United States and Austria-Hungary which prompted the government of the United States to make reply.
