CHANGE CAUSES SPECULATION IN ATHENS

Difference of Opinion as to Whether This Means Assurances Have Beer Received of a Delay in Teutonic In vasion, or the Fulfillment of Promises to the Allies-Fighting Con tinues in Albanian Hills.

ATHENS, Dec. 24.-Greece today is sued a month's furlough to 15 per cent of her reserves, who have been under arms for five months.

This action caused much surprise here, in view of the fact that a Tedtonic invasion for an offensive against the allied expeditionary forces as Sa lonika is about to begin.

Some interpret this as an indication that Germany has assured Greece that there will be no invasion for at least - "My Dear Jerushy" - Lucille a month. To others, the order seems to fulfill the reported promise to the allies that Greece would demobilize half her army.
