NON-PARTISANSHIP

PRESIDENT WILSON has decided that preparedness should be made a non-partisan issue. Senator Owen and his coterie have decided that a cloture rule in the senate should be made a non-partisan question. These momentous decisions were reached after it had been discovered that neither preparedness nor cloture could be put through by Democratic votes only. The non-partisanism which Mr. Wilson, Mr. Owen and others in the Democratic party adhere to is the kind of non-partisanism which consists solely in getting Republicans to pull Democratic chestnuts out of the fire. When there is a reliable Democratic majority to be had, there is no talk of non-partisanism. A secret party caucus is held, which votes to hog-tie all the opponents of whatever the caucus majority may at the minute have in mind; and then the caucus mandate is executed by party votes in the house or senate, as the case may be. But when the Democratic majority is slender, or not to be depended upon, then comes the cry for non-partisanism.

It is familiar Democratic trick; and it is by no means confined to Washington. We can all recall Democratic candidates for minor offices who go about soliciting Republican votes on the ground that no real party question is at stake. Sometimes—too often, we are bound to say—Republicans fall for this sort of thing.

We doubt, however, if they do so this time. They will co-operate with President Wilson in a programme for preparedness. But they will lay much emphasis on the "Co;" and if Mr. Wilson wants to be non-partisan in the matter he will have to be more considerate of Republican opinion and suggestion than he ever yet has been.

NATIONAL CIVIC ASS'N. CONVENES

PRESIDENT'S DAUGHTER TAKES ACTIVE PART IN IMPORTANT SESSIONS BEGINNING TODAY IN THE CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 28.—The Eleventh Annual convention of the American Civic Association was convened here today by men and women prominent in social and scientific work. Miss Margaret Wilson, daughter of the President, is to take a prominent part in the sessions. The convention is simultaneous with those of the American Historical association, American Society of International Law, American Sociological Society, American Political association, American Association for Labor Legislation and Pan-American Scientific Congress.

At the morning meeting, Mrs. Percy V. Pennybacker, Austin, Texas, president of the General Federation of Women's clubs; Clinton Rogers Woodruff, Philadelphia, secretary of the National Municipal League; Frederick Law Olmsted, Brookline, Mass., chairman of the National Conference on City Planning; Dr. Henry Sturgis Drinker, president of Lehigh University and of the American Forestry association; the Rev. A. H. Scott, Percy, Canada, representing the Ontario Horticulture associations; the Lord and Lady Aberdeen of Scotland, on behalf of the British Civic workers, extended greetings from their respective organizations.

This evening J. Horace McFarland, Harrisburg, Pa., president of the American Civic association, will make his annual address on "What Shall We Do With Niagara."

Permanent Registration to Begin Monday, Jan. 3

John P. Jones, nor J. P. Jones; and Mary Ellen Jones, nor Mrs. John Jones nor Mrs. J. P. Jones.

5—Blank "B" on the back of the registration card is to be used in connection with the regular form when an elector has removed to a new precinct, and desires to re-register there, and by executing this card, thereby cancels his former registration.

6—Blank "A" is to be used only before boards of election, and requires two witnesses.

7—Any citizen of the United States of the age of 21 years and upwards, who shall have resided in the state during the six months preceding an election, is entitled to register and vote at such election. Also any elector who may complete his residence during the period in which the registers are closed or who may attain the age of 21 years, may register during a period of thirty days next preceding the closing of the registration for the election at which he desires to vote, but the clerk or registrar shall indorse upon the registration card in red ink these words: Qualified to vote

(month) (day) (year)

8—Foreign born persons: All persons born in a foreign country of alien parents, no matter at what age they came to this country, are aliens unless the naturalization laws of the United States have been complied with, either by themselves after they became 21 years of age, or by their parents before they became 21 years of age.

9—The state constitutional amendment passed by the people at the last election requires that all aliens must have become fully naturalized before being allowed to vote in this state. Therefore, those persons who have only their "declaration of intention" (commonly known as first papers) can not legally register for elections in this state. This law requires that "final citizenship papers" (commonly known as second papers), be exhibited to the registration officer before he can register them.

10—Some confusion may result unless registering officers are careful in this respect, as in many of the old forms of naturalization papers the first papers, or "declarations," are very similar to the second or "final" papers, therefore the papers should be carefully examined to see that they read to show that the alien "is admitted a citizen of the United States."

Under the former laws of Oregon second papers were not required, declaration of intention or first papers being sufficient. Former registrations in this county do not show which were exhibited, hence the necessity of care on the part of the registrars in this particular.

The following will give you the requirements, also the status of the fam-

ilies of aliens:

1—Naturalized citizens must exhibit "final" citizenship papers.

2—If the father of an alien became naturalized before he (the child) became of age, he is a naturalized citizen but must exhibit the father's papers or a copy of the same from the court issuing them.

3—A foreign woman married to a citizen of the United States is a citizen.

4—An American woman who marries a foreigner, takes the nationality of her husband, and must exhibit his papers if he becomes a naturalized citizen; at the termination of the marital relation, if she continues to reside here she may resume her citizenship.

5—Foreign born unmarried women must be naturalized themselves after they become 21 years of age or by their father before they became of age; if married to a foreigner who is naturalized, she must exhibit his final papers.

6—Any foreign woman who acquires citizenship by marriage to an American retains the same after the termination of marital relations, if she continues to reside here, and unless she make formal renunciation of citizenship.

7—Service in the United States army or navy of aliens does not, as is generally believed, imply citizenship, unless petition for final papers has been made and papers issued, such service eliminating only the necessity of first papers.

8—Proof of filing on homestead is not sufficient proof of citizenship. Certified copies of final papers can be had by writing to the clerk of the court where they were issued, if the originals are lost.
