#### A STITCH IN TIME

WHILE Klamath county has not as yet felt the ravages of the rabies plague, which through the medium of coyotes, is sweeping Modoc, Lassen, Lake and adjoining counties, there is no telling when the epidemic will reach here, unless everybody takes a hand in the extermination of the coyote, at best a predatory animal, preying on stock and game. A trace of what is supposed to be rabies was found near Elly yesterday, which brings the need of action much more forcibly to the attention of all.

The county court, in order to encourage the slaughter of coyotes, has raised the bounty for next year until each coyote will mean \$1.25 for the man killing him. Fort Klamath people have pledged themselves to pay an additional \$2.00 per head for each coyote killed in that section.

With this remuneration in sight, to say nothing of the market for hides, it would appear that the hunting of coyotes could be carried on profitably this winter by many who would not otherwise be employed.

#### THE WORD "BOCHE"

THE word "boche," a new one in the French language, introduced since the beginning of the great war as a designation to be applied to a German, is regarded as a most offensive expression when applied by any one to a French man or woman.

It now figures frequently in French courts as a term of abuse, for which the user sometimes pays a money penalty or as much as eight days of imprisonment. Recently also women were brought into court and the complainant, a man, asked for 5,000 francs as damages because these dames had called him a "boche."

One definition of the word "boche" which interpreted into English means a dunderhead, a nincompoop, a blockhead, a numskull, an ignoramus, a mutton head and several other things, which the Germans are not.

## 16-Inch Gun, Greatest Weapon of Uncle Sam for Preparedness



This monster rifle on which twenty men may sit comfortably, as large as anything owned by any government in the world, with the single exception of the German 42 centimeter—which is a mortar—is Uncle Sam's best weapon for preparedness. It has recently been completed at the Watervliet arsenal, and was sent to the proving grounds at Sandy Hook. The map shows their radius of action, and how they can protect New York city and environs from an invading foe. The range of the gun mounted on a disappearing carriage, may easily be made twenty miles by elevation, and this would permit it to beat off ships which might go near enough Manhattan or Brooklyn in New York, or Newark, Jersey City or Elizabeth in New Jersey, to do damage. In fact, it would be able to protect several million persons and many billions in property. The gun is 40 feet 4

ships from New York by Hamburg-American line officials; 28, France seized Dacia.

March 10, German raider Prinz Eitel Friedrich arrived at Newport News and later interned; 28, Leo Thrauer, American, killed when German submarine torpedoed British steamer Falaba.

April 1, French \$50,000,000 loan negotiated; 5, United States asks Germany for reparation for schooner William P. Frye; 6, France released August Piepenbrink, German, seized on American steamer; note to England declares German blockade illegal; 7, Prinz Eitel Friedrich interned; Germany protested against steamer Odenwald's detention at San Juan, Porto Rico; 11, German raider Kranprinz Wilhelm reached Newport News; 12, Germany protests against American munitions sales to allies; 21, State department advises Germany munition sales are made by legal right; 26, Kranprinz Wilhelm interned.

May 1, Lusitania sailed from New York despite German embassy warnings; 2, American steamer Guilford torpedoed by German submarine off Scilly Isles, three Americans killed; 7,

Lusitania torpedoed by German submarine, 114 Americans killed; 12, United States note to Germany demands disavowal Lusitania attack, reparation and cessation of submarine warfare; 25, American steamer Nebraska sunk by mine or torpedo; 30, Germany delivers reply note to Ambassador Gerard regarding Lusitania, alleging vessel armed.

June 5, German note regrets attacks on Cushing and Guilford; 9, Secretary of State Bryan resigns; 10, United States sends second Lusitania note to Germany, holding her to strict accountability; 25, England refuses to abandon German blockade; 29, Canadian liner Armenian torpedoed, 31 American hostiles killed.

July 7, Navy department takes control of German wireless plant at Sayvill, L. I.; 16, Austria in note protests against munitions sales to the allies; 19, Cunarder Orduna unsuccessfully chased by submarine; 25, United States sends third Lusitania note to Germany, advising that a repetition will be considered "deliberately unfriendly"; 27, American steamer Leeland submarine, crew saved.

August 4, three notes from England upheld orders in council, German blockade and American commerce interference; note from Germany defends sinking schooner William P. Frye, but agrees to payment of damages; 16, United States advises Austria that munitions sales are legal; correspondence revealing operations of German agents published; 19, Arabic torpedoed, two Americans killed.

September 1, Ambassador Bernstorff notified state department Germany agrees to sink no more liners without warning; 2, James P. J. Archibald's arrest at Falmouth discloses carrying documents for Austrian Ambassador Dumba and Captain von Popen; 3, Cardinal Gibbons presents pope's peace plea to President Wilson; 4, British ship Hesperian torpedoed or mined; 9, Germany delivers note declaring Arabic attacked German submarine; 10, United States demands Austrian Ambassador Dumba's recall; 17, England seizes \$15,000,000 worth of American meat cargoes; 24, England agrees to release American goods held at Rotterdam; 29, Anglo-French half billion loan negotiated.
