in the Fort section," said one Wood River Valley man today. "We believe there is danger of a spread of rabies if coyotes are allowed to come in from Modoc, Lassen and Lake counties, and we consider what we pay for extra bounty but a small part of what our cattle losses could be from rabies.

"Any coyotes shot since the first of the year in the Wood River country are eligible for our \$5 bounty. Hunters should bring the hides to Winnek's store at the Fort. A mark will be put on the ears, and \$5 cash will be paid the hunter. The hides can then be brought to Klamath Falls for the other \$6.50 bounty, and for sale to hide buyers."

**FISHES WITHOUT LICENSE: JAILED**

Charged with fishing without a license, Andy O'Malley was arrested yesterday by Deputy Game Warden Henry Stout. He was taken before Justice Gowen, and fined \$25.

If you will kindly furnish me with samples of Oregon yellow pine flooring I will submit the same to the supervising architect here.

### MRS. HUNTER IS FIGHTING HARD

DEMURRER FILED TO HER INDICTMENT BY ATTORNEY GETS UP SEVERAL PERTINENT POINTS FOR DISMISSAL

A demurrer to the indictment of Mrs. Guy Hunter is the latest development in the case growing out of the shooting of Mrs. Alma Kuehne near Dodd Hollow, a couple of weeks ago. In the demurrer, W. H. A. Renner, Mrs. Hunter's attorney makes the following points:

Failure of the indictment to state facts sufficient to constitute a crime.  
No such a crime as first degree murder in Oregon, and court has no power

to inflict punishment, even if conviction is obtained.  
Indictment does not properly lay the venue so the court has jurisdiction.  
Indictment procured by testimony of improper and illegal evidence, which is contrary to the statutes.  
Mrs. Hunter's time for pleading is set for tomorrow at 1 o'clock.  
Hunter yesterday afternoon entered a plea of "not guilty" to the murder charge against him.  
Hugh Clopton today plead to the indictment. His plea was "not guilty."  
Albert Mamado, indicted for burglary, will plead tomorrow at 1 o'clock.
