CRYSTAL GIVEN VERDICT IN CASE

FORMER LOCAL SALOON MAN RECOVERS \$500 DAMAGES FROM THOMAS LOVE AND SURETY CONCERN

A verdict of \$500 has been rendered in favor of A. L. Crystal by the circuit court jury hearing the evidence in his suit against Thomas Love and the National Surety company.

The suit grows out of the arrest a year ago of Crystal by Love on charge of larceny by bailor, Love alleging Crystal withheld \$1,500 belonging to Love. A civil suit was also instituted to recover this money, and under this, the "second class" saloon was attached.

Crystal demanded damages for the serious blow to his business, reputation, etc., this attachment and temporary closing of the saloon caused. Fred H. Mills was Crystal's attorney.
