STATE PROVIDES FOR QUAIL FEED

SNOWFALL BRINGS HUNDREDS
OF BIRDS INTO CITY LIMITS.
MANY FARMERS THROWING
WHEAT FOR BIRDS

Flocks of quail are no uncommon sight in different parts of Klamath Falls this week. These birds are coming in close on account of the depth of snow covering their natural feeding grounds, and along the water courses near Center avenue the birds are noticeably thick.

In order to properly protect the birds, the state fish and game commission has agreed to pay farmers or others who will feed grain to the birds during the winter months. Anybody contemplating feeding quail should communicate at once with Game Warden Henry Stout if they wish remuneration.

Many Klamath county ranchers will feed the quail as a voluntary contribution to the conservation of Klamath's game. Along Lost River there are several ranches where hundreds of quail are fed every day.
