PROSPERITY INSURANCE

A UNITED community is a prosperous community. Rivalry and discord involve waste of energy, the stuff from which prosperity is manufactured. Energy properly directed brings success and prosperity; wrongly expended it prevents progress, and makes success in its proper sense out of the question. A community whose people are at loggerheads cannot be really prosperous and progressive.

The one way in which to insure prosperity for your community in 1916 and thereafter is to organize it for community building. Its people must discover or be shown the multitude of interests that they have in common; channels must be opened up for unified effort in behalf of the public welfare. Peace, harmony and progress must be the watchwords for the future.

Local development can be and should be made sound and safe development. Local investments should be made profitable by the building up of a community of interest and the stimulating of a public spirit that shall make secure every legitimate business and every basic resource.

The only rivalries that should find a place in community development are those inspired by a desire to excel in efforts to promote the public welfare. Proper consideration of the public welfare never involves the sacrifice of private rights; though the unrestrained pursuit of private ambitions may not always work for the public benefit. The rights of the public should always be respected whether there be anyone to assert them or not.

Participation in community development is the passport to good citizenship; it is narrow selfishness to devote all one's energies to private affairs and to give no time or consideration to the legitimate claims of one's community. There is neither wisdom nor permanent profit in so doing. Private progress is best insured by community progress and community progress is made secure by community building—the co-operation of citizens in developing their community along spiritual as well as material lines.

Nation in Grip of Its Greatest Skating Craze

Bronx. Many public tennis courts are being used this year for skating rinks. The areas are flooded with a few inches of water, and many of them can accommodate one hundred skaters at one time.

The demand for skates, skating shoes, and costumes reflects the popularity of the sport. None of the sporting stores can keep up with the demand.

Where 25,000 pairs of skates were sold in this city last year, it is believed the output this season will approximately reach 155,000. If predictions come true, New Yorkers will improve their health as a result of their season of skating. It is a great weight reducer.

The surprising feature of the ice skating revival is the amount of money spent on the sport. Last year it is estimated that for skates, shoes, sweaters, and caps the skaters in New York spent nearly \$320,000. With the desire of the women to have special costumes to wear while skating, the cost of the fun has jumped to great proportions. For skates, boots, and costumes this season it is fully believed that New Yorkers will spend something like \$2,600,000.

Skating is more healthful fun than dancing in the smoke laden air of the cabarets. It means red cheeks and big appetites.

The park department has appropriated money to provide for calcium lights for the skaters on the ponds and lakes. Most of them well lighted at night, and this innovation will be received with enthusiasm by the skaters.

The skating instructor has replaced the dancing master and skating instructors reap a harvest teaching society girls the art of skating. Cornelius Fellows at St. Nicholas rink estimates that as many as 21,000 people skate at the rink every week.

There is a skating club of society young ladies who meet at the rink every Monday afternoon. The membership is limited to 400. Among the

patronesses are Mrs. Russell H. Hoadley, Jr., Mrs. Phillip Golden Bartlett and Mrs. Walter Jennings. Among the members are Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbult, Mrs. Edwin A. Stevens, Mrs. Daniel S. Lamont, Mrs. Joseph H. Choate, Jr., Mrs. John Drexel, Mrs. James Brown and Misses Brown, and Mrs. Lewis L. Delafeld.

Twenty years ago St. Nicholas rink was started as an exclusive skating club, but after a few years the fad was forgotten. Many years before that skating was taken up in New York by comparatively few people. An old print of the date of 1860 shows a skating party of society people on a small pond down town somewhere in the neighborhood of Grand street. The men wore silk hats and big muffers and the women dressed in the fashion of the day, with hoop skirts.

Fancy skating has come in for considerable attention. Ever since the skating ballet took the town by surprise at one of the theatres, the skating fad has been gaining in popularity until, at the present time, it has assumed such great proportions that the skate manufacturers will be busy filling orders until well into the new year.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—British abandonment of the Dardanelles campaign brings into prominence a new leader upon whom Great Britain will inevitably build her future hopes. This man is General Monro, who, since retirement of General Ian Hamilton, has been in charge of the ill-starred expedition. He has shown large qualities of decision, independence, and efficiency since he was appointed to the Gallipoli campaign in October.

He immediately recommended the evacuation of the peninsula, but his report was not taken as the final word in the situation until Earl Kitchener confirmed his view through a personal inspection of that region. Monro was there upon given the task of accomplishing the withdrawal. This was one of the most difficult duties of the whole war, but Monro fulfilled it with practically no losses. And, it is hard to match this feat in the annals of successful retreats.

Monro now goes to France to succeed Sir Douglas Haig, as chief of staff. Upon Monro will devolve the direction of the expected offensive in the spring, a move that may be fraught with importance for the allies' arms. The failure of the Turks to punish the retiring British confirms criticisms of the ability of the Turks when it comes to staging an effective offensive. This view has the effect in England of strengthening the general idea that Egypt is secure from any offensive by the Sultan's followers.
