Annual Report of Secretary of Commercial Club Shows Activity

Work Accomplished During Past Year, and Outlook for the Coming Year Are Told of by Fred Fleet. Owing to Length, Report Is Printed in Two Installments

The close of the term of office of the Klamath Commercial Club directors is here. The time has arrived for an accounting of our stewardship, what we have accomplished with the power and the money intrusted to us by the general membership of the organization.

After going carefully over the work of the past year we are proud to say that we thoroughly believe that most beneficial results have accrued from the club's activities than in any other year of its previous history.

The first and foremost of these is, of course, the new railroad proposition, with which all are familiar. During the early part of last winter the organization attempted a campaign for inducement of new factories for Klamath county. It was very soon apparent, however, that with our present unfortunate transportation facilities, our chances for locating mills or factories of any description were slight, and that the primal glaring need of the city and county was relief from the railroad situation.

We accordingly abandoned the factories for the time being, and set to work in a systematic way to obtain a northern railroad outlet. The original idea was to secure an extension of the Oregon Trunk line south from Bend to Kirk, and to force the same by the leverage of the big Portland shippers over the Hill system. Following several months of strenuous effort during which every business house of consequence in Portland was approached several times, the Portland business interests heeded our importunities, and took the matter up with the Hill officials. No satisfaction was received from Mr. Hill, but the Portland men, having become interested in the matter, discovered the tremendous resources and future possibilities of this section and their annual loss in trade through the lack

of railroad connection, and set about getting assistance from other sources. The story of their appeal to Robert E. Strahorn, his investigations, report and subsequent proceedings is now known by everyone.

With the bright prospects of the new road in view, another vigorous campaign for woolen mills, beet sugar factories, sash and door factories, etc., has been initiated, and we venture to assert that no other section on the coast is so well advertised in the minds of those we have sought to interest.

The Klamath county exhibit at the world's fair in San Francisco has been another matter which has been managed entirely by the Commercial Club, and one which has necessitated no little expenditure of time and money. Though handicapped with only a fraction of the financial support supplied by other counties for this enterprise, by a careful expenditure of this money and by securing the services of an exceptionally able representative, we achieved results far exceeding our proportionate investment, and it is generally admitted that Klamath county was about as widely advertised as any other in the Oregon building. Klamath County Day, celebrated during the last month of the fair, was a huge success from every standpoint, with the governor and other prominent Oregonians on the program. Out of fourteen entries for prizes on Klamath county products, thirteen medals were received, evidencing the fertility of the land we sought to exploit.

The Manufacturers and Land Products show at Portland from October 25th to November 13th was another occasion at which Klamath county was represented by the efforts of the Commercial Club. A good representative exhibit, although not an elaborate one, was maintained at this show, the county being represented by Mrs. John Cook, a loyal Klamath property owner, residing in Portland. Several prizes and medals were secured at Portland, also.

Another advertising medium which has proved of wonderful value in getting Klamath county before the public, and which will continue to do so, is the Klamath moving pictures. These pictures, prepared at the instigation of the Commercial Club, at a cost of \$400, depicting the various industries, resources and scenic gems
