INTEMPERANCE OF PROHIBITION, TAFT TOPIC



FORMER PRESIDENT TAFT AS HE APPEARS AS A PRIVATE CITIZEN

Declaring himself in favor of temperance, former President Taft has just struck a blow at what he calls the intemperance of proposed prohibition in California. His declaration, before a convention of California hotel men, has become a big topic in the Golden state, where it is being given wide circulation by the business press.

"I believe in temperance," said Mr. Taft, "and what I want to avoid is that the men who do not believe in temperance and men who are moderate in their views of everything should not be ground between the top and the nether millstones of the extremes on both sides of that question. Therefore, I am opposed to either a saloon-keeper or to the extreme of prohibition. Let us deal with the matter in a common sense way. Let us deal with human nature as it is. Understand what the conditions are and then adopt the laws to ameliorate them. Do not put a lot of laws on our statute books that we know in our hearts we can't enforce—just an attempt to fool the people."

"Let us have a system of local option where in a community they will support the enforcement of law."

Jubilant over the declaration of the former executive, President Wilson, of the California Hotel Men's Association, declares the "speech will stand as a guide for the future action of hotel men the country over."

DUCK SEASON TO CLOSE SATURDAY

STATE GAME WARDEN ISSUES INSTRUCTIONS FOR ENFORCEMENT OF THE FEDERAL GAME LAW IN OREGON

But three more days remain for sportsmen to enjoy duck shooting in Oregon, without the danger of running foul of the game laws. State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker has issued an order to all deputy wardens to enforce the federal statute, which closes the duck shooting season Saturday.

The last Oregon legislature extended the season to January 31st, but in view of the conflicting dates the game warden will enforce the federal law.
