**POWER CO. STOCK SOLD YESTERDAY**

NOT ENOUGH STOCK PURCHASED BY ANY ONE PARTY OR GROUP TO CHANGE THE CONTROL OF THE CORPORATION

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 13.—Most of the 13,000 shares of Oregon-California Power company stock offered for sale to satisfy delinquencies in assessments was taken up and paid for in cash. A few small lots were sold to the treasury of the company.

According to J. D. McKee, president of the Mercantile National bank, no one bought enough stock at the sale to change the control of the company. McKee says his bank does not seek to get the controlling interest, now held by the Churchills and Rosboroughs.

The annual election of officers will be held next Tuesday at the company's offices here.

**Pope Is Ready to Start Peace Moves This Week**

ROME, Jan. 13.—Pope Benedict hopes to take the first practical steps toward peace this week.

Cardinal Mercier of Belgium and Bishop Heylen of Namur are expected here and will be granted an audience with his holiness, when they will tell him the terms upon which Belgium will agree to an early peace.

The pope has been convinced from the beginning of the great war that restoration of Belgium is an imperative preliminary to any peace terms, and it is understood that he has notified both sides. In the recent consistory, Cardinal Hartman of Cologne submitted Germany's terms for

evacuation of Belgium. The pope next desired to learn the Belgians' views, and to this end, Germany readily consented to passage of the prelate to Rome.

Several members of the Belgian relief committee from London are already in Rome, and it is understood that the vatican will solicit their views as to the solution of the Belgian problem. After learning the terms of Belgium, the pope plans to submit them to Germany, hoping to begin a series of compromises he believes necessary to peace.

Though Belgium has been crushed by invasion, the fact that she has the backing of the allies places her in a position at least to formulate the terms which the pope seeks.

**Peterson Tells of Meets of Importance to State**

In Oregon, the irrigation congress held that the course must be to resort to district irrigation, owing to the failure of Carey act projects, and the inadequacy of future funds for government irrigation. To make irrigation districts a success, the bonds of such districts as the state decides as feasible, must be guaranteed by the state.

Steps were taken at this time to have an amendment presented at the next election when the people of Oregon will be called upon to vote on the question of state guarantee of drainage and irrigation district bonds. This congress also went on record as favoring a state rural credits plan.

"At the road building conference, the dominant note was: 'Have a definite and progressive plan for road work, build the best roads possible, considering locality and resources, and when the roads are built, maintain them.' The crying need all over the state seems to be for intelligent maintenance of roads after construction. Some counties favor the local patrol system.

"The lectures at the drainage conference dealt largely with drainage problems, particularly with the equitable distribution of drainage costs. Where drainage districts cover any considerable area, the problem of financing them is similar to that of financing irrigation districts, and state guarantee is required to insure long time loans with low interest rates.

The State Grange and Farmers Union are in the forefront in the matter of securing rural credits legislation. The most feasible plan suggested seemed to be that of using the irrefragable school fund of about \$6,000,000 as a revolving fund, and issue bonds using these mortgages as security. As more mortgages came to hand further bond issues could be floated. Funds secured in this way could probably be loaned for long terms on good security, at a rate of

**What the War Moves Mean**

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—The British are in a better position to carry on the struggle at Kut-El-Amara, Mesopotamia, than the Turks encircling them, because of having more advantageous communication.

General Aylmer has unobstructed use of the Tigris from the base of the Persian Gulf. The Turks cannot move down the Tigris because Kut-El-Amara blocks their path, and they must move supplies over the marshy land, while rain is increasing their difficulties.

Aylmer began his relief march Thursday from Imam Ali Gherbi, sixty miles southeast of Kut-El-Amara, and it is believed he has reached Sheikh Saed, midway between the two points. The Turks must move from their base to attack him, and once they do, they will be hampered by communication problems. Aylmer undoubtedly will be able to penetrate to Kut-El-Amara, but he may be compelled to move cautiously, fearing that if he rushed in he, too, would be bottled up. It is possible he will need reinforcements before continuing to Kut-El-Amara and Bagdad, and thus accomplish the purpose of the campaign.

5 per cent to 5 1/2 per cent. Committees are at present at work in formulating plans for a state plan of rural credits.
