LOWEST RECORD FOR TARIFF RATES

A LOW record for the Underwood law as a revenue producer was chalked up last week ending December 25th, 1915. The average duty rate for the week was 8.7, the worst showing thus far made by the Underwood tariff since its enactment in October, 1913.

President Wilson and Senator Underwood ought to be proud of the Christmas present to Uncle Sam for which their tariff folly has produced. On imports valued at \$30,799,642, entered at the thirteen principal customs districts of the United States, revenue was collected in the sum of \$2,688,866.

That accounts for Secretary McAdoo's financial jugglery, and his desire to levy a tax on everything from tombstones to false teeth. Everything going out and nothing coming in, so far as revenues are concerned.

LAWS AGAINST KISSING

ON JULY 16, 1439, an act was passed forbidding kissing, owing to the pestilence raging over England and France. That is the only enactment passed against kissing in England; but in several countries there are stringent regulations against kissing in public.

The Bavarian state railways forbid kissing on their railway system.

One of the French railway companies two years ago promulgated a bylaw by which kissing was added to the list of things banned, but the physicians of Milwaukee about the same time went a step further, and prepared a bill for the absolute suppression of kissing on the ground of the practice being a menace to health.

HUERTA'S WILD CAREER ENDS WITH HIS DEMISE; TO BE BURIED IN MEXICO

ant work. He chose the geographical division.

The next ten years he traveled Mexico, mapping the country, and by 1902 he possessed more intimate knowledge of Mexico than any other living man. Diaz made him a brigadier general.

Huerta first came into public notice in 1911, when President Diaz, forced to flee, chose Huerta to give him safe conduct to Vera Cruz. Bandits attacked the train, Huerta routed them. As Diaz was saying farewell he was asked why he had not sent Huerta against Francisco Madero. The dictator replied: "Because I did not trust him."

Upon Madero's inauguration, Huerta's pay was cut in half. Orozco, the bandit, rose to dispute Madero's power. Huerta was sent to crush the outlaw. Then Madero retired him.

Emilo Zapata and his outlaws came to terrorize Morelos. Madero summoned Huerta, and as the bandits were about to be annihilated Madero recalled Huerta to Mexico City to withdraw his command. Madero distrusted and feared Huerta.

When Madero began to lose prestige and Felix Diaz, nephew of the former dictator, instigated a revolt in the capital, Huerta was put in charge of Madero's defenders. After a conference with Diaz, Huerta imprisoned

Texas Hay for Barriers

Many thousands of tons of Texas hay are being used as a bulwark against bullets on the lines of defense by the British and French governments. This fact has just come to light by the statements of foreign buyers of hay, who also direct the compression of the bales before shipment from Galveston, to make them as nearly bullet proof as possible. Three ordinary field bales are compressed into one bale before being loaded on a vessel. This process gives the bales a density that is said to make it equal to steel plate in stopping bullets. It is stated that trenches are being lined with the bales of hay.

his chief and forced the Mexican congress to name himself as provisional president. Madero and Suarez were shot. Diaz was promised the presidency in six months.

Huerta gave as his excuse for forsaking Madero, the killing of 3,000 Mexicans in the ten days' battle in the capital, and his desire to stop bloodshed.

But two events blocked Huerta's plans. President Wilson refused to acknowledge Huerta. Then General Venustiano Carranza, governor of Coahuila, declined to bow to the new government until it was established by an "unhindered election." Seven other northern states followed suit. Aided by the lifting of the arms embargo by the United States when Huerta refused to step down, the constitutionalist cause grew.

John Lind, special envoy, was sent to Mexico to ameliorate conditions. Huerta refused to recognize Lind, because he was not "officially accredited." After saying he would not be a presidential candidate, Huerta declared himself dictator of Mexico on October 10, 1913, imprisoning congress to prevent opposition. This was sixteen days before the scheduled election.

Many Mexicans, incensed at the imprisonment of certain member-deputies, turned to Felix Diaz. A conspiracy was formed to assassinate the dictator and put Diaz in the presidency. The plotters were jailed, and Diaz was forced to seek an asylum on a United States warship. Huerta ig-

nored President Wilson's demand that "Huerta must go." Marines were insulted by Huerta's soldiers at Vera Cruz. Admiral Fletcher asked Huerta to apologize by saluting the American flag. He refused, parleyed and finally severed relations when Admiral Fletcher seized the Vera Cruz customs house, Huerta's chief source of revenue. This was April 22, 1914.

Other Huertista ports were blockaded to prevent the dictator getting war supplies. President Wilson, believing Huerta's power near an end, and with the constitutionalists winning, stayed further drastic action. Eight days later Huerta agreed to the A. B. C. mediators' proposal for an armistice with Carranza, pending peace negotiations.

While the conference was in session jealousy arose between Villa and Carranza. Huerta seized this opportunity for holding on. His cabinet meetings were held in cafes.

With finances at a low ebb, the dictator suddenly relinquished the presidency July 15, 1914, and sailed from Vera Cruz for Europe. Francisco Cadajal was left in charge of the bankrupt government, which was finally wrested by General Carranza.

Huerta returned to the United States in 1915, and was arrested at the border by United States agents because Uncle Sam believed Huerta intended to start a Mexican revolution in the interests of certain European powers, for the purpose of embarrassing the United States. The arrest broke Huerta physically.

WINNIPEG, Man., Jan. 14.—W. J. De La Mars of Doblin, Man., is to leave here today for Washington, to perfect, he says, forty airships with which he claims he can destroy Berlin in a day. Each airship, he also claims, will carry nine tons of nitro-glycerine and thirty barrels of gasoline, will be able to travel 150 miles an hour and stay in the air twenty-six days. He says he will build twenty airships at Washington for the British navy. The other twenty will protect North American shores.
