

## Explosion on U. S. Submarine Endangers the Entire Crew

### FIVE KILLED IN EXPLOSION ON A U. S. SUBMARINE

FIFTEEN ARE REPORTED AS FATALLY INJURED

American Diver of the "E" Type Suffers Serious Mishap While at the Dock in Brooklyn Navy Yard—Entire Interior Was Ablaze, and All Members of the Crew Were in Danger of Horrible Death.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—(Bulletin)—According to the latest report from the commandant of the Brooklyn navy yard, five men were killed outright and upwards of fifteen were fatally hurt in the submarine explosion late this afternoon.

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—One man was killed, three were fatally injured and nine others seriously injured in an explosion aboard the submarine E-2, in the Brooklyn navy yard this morning.

It is believed that a defective battery was the cause of the tragedy. When the rescuers arrived the inside of the vessel was ablaze. The rescuers played on the flames with hose until the injured were rescued. The clothing of some of the men was on fire when rescued. Many of the badly burned are thought to be beyond recovery.

### STORM ON SOUND DROWNS SEVERAL

GASOLINE LAUNCHES AND SMALL SLOOP ARE TOSSED ABOUT BY ANGRY WAVES—WAVES HINDER RESCUE WORK

### BANDITS WILL BE SHOT FOR MAKING ATTACK ON MINERS

CARRANZA PROMISES SEVERE PUNISHMENT

In View of the Attitude Taken by Provisional Head of Mexican Government, United States Officials Will Give Him a Chance to Act, Believing He Is Capable—Americans Want Consul Edwards Recalled.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The following was received today from General Janicito Trevino of Chihuahua, in charge of the troops seeking the bandits killing Americans near Santa Ysabel this week.

"The punishment to be administered to the culprits responsible for the San Ysabel massacre of Americans will be identical with that meted to Generals Rodriguez, Carlos and Alameda."

These were all shot this week, charged with being connected with the plot.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—There is no prospect of any interference with the administration's policy of giving Carranza a chance to punish the Mexican band murdering sixteen Americans at Santa Ysabel this week.

The senate has adjourned until Monday. It believes that Carranza will in the meantime show he can do as much or more handling the situation than America could by intervention.

The house is still in session, but it is not thought that the members will give any trouble. The members respect Carranza's personal pledge to Wilson and Lansing that he is hunting the murderers with due diligence. Americans at El Paso have wired in numerous requests that American Consul Edwards at Jaurez be ousted. They charge him with being largely responsible for Americans returning to the mines in Mexico, as he assured them there would be no harm.

The state department promises no immediate action on this matter.

### Armed Italian Vessel Leaving N. Y. Likely to Cause Trouble



Hurriedly Covering Port Gun of Giuseppe Verdi as She Steamed Into New York Harbor. Starboard Gun Already Covered.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—As the result of the clearance from New York harbor of the armed Italian liner Giuseppe Verdi, representations are expected soon from Austria. This is the only phrase of the submarine controversy to be settled.

As soon as he learned that American officials allowed the Verdi to clear while it carried guns, Austrian Charge de Affaires Zweidinek wired Vienna, asking his government how he should act in the matter.

When the Italian liner Giuseppe Verdi reached New York the other day she steamed proudly into port with two rapid-firer guns mounted on the poop-deck above the stern. But when the captain learned that this information had been wired to Secretary of State Lansing and that he

ordered an inquiry the guns were hurriedly covered. The captain said that they had been ordered on the ship as a protection against submarines in the Mediterranean. Whether or not the display of these guns makes the liner a war vessel, which may remain in an American port only long enough to repair, coal and provision was the subject of discussion with the Italian ambassador.

### MORE TRIALS ON LAND SCANDALS

### NEBRASKA FEELS WAR'S PROFITS

STATE IS BEING STRIPPED OF ITS WALNUT TREES TO PROVIDE GUN STOCKS FOR THE ALLIES

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 15.—Munition makers in the East are not the only ones to whom the European war is bringing increased incomes. Nebraska land owners who have walnut groves about their homes or walnut timber along the creeks on their land are reaping a harvest.

Four carloads of walnut logs to be used in the manufacture of gun stocks for the European armies were shipped in one day from Sprague, Neb. All this lumber was grown near Sprague. It was sold to a Kansas City firm which will make it into rifle stocks before shipping it abroad.

Most of this supply will go to England and Russia.

### JURY IS OUT IN THE HILL TRIAL

FOLLOWING JURORS' REQUEST AS TO ADDING RECOMMENDATION, MANY EXPECT A DISAGREEMENT

The question of the guilt or innocence of W. C. Hill charged with desertion and non-support, was placed in the hands of the jury shortly after one o'clock today. As yet, they have not returned a verdict, and many believe, since the jury returned once this afternoon, there will be a disagreement.

After being out for nearly two hours, the jurors came into court to ask if the members could make a recommendation for leniency on their verdict. They were informed by Circuit Judge Kuykendall that this could not be made a part of the verdict, although the judge did not rule against the recommendation being brought in as a separate document.

### ROMANS INSIST MONTENEGRINS SEEKING PEACE

KING REPORTED ON WAY FOR NEGOTIATIONS

Whereabouts of King and His Army Defeated at Cetinje Is a Mystery in Rome, But Late Vienna Advices Say They Are Falling Back Toward Albania—Bulgarian Official Just Escapes Assassination.

ROME, Jan. 15.—According to Austrian advices intercepted here, the diplomatic corps formerly stationed at Cetinje, reached Scutaria this morning, following the fall of the Montenegrin capital. Several Montenegrin officials accompanied the foreign diplomats.

The whereabouts of King Nicholas and the forces with which he withdrew from Cetinje's defense is a mystery. It is believed by many that the king is on his way to Scutari to negotiate for the proposed Austro-Montenegrin peace.

### PAPEN'S PAPERS WILL MAKE U. S. ANGRY--ENGLAND

GERMAN EMBASSY, THOUGH, IS NOT INTERESTED

British Feel That as a Result of Giving Publicity to Alleged Connection Between German Officials and Werner von Horn, Americans Will Not Fight Against the British Blockade Move.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Officials declare that the British foreign office has executed a remarkably clever coup by giving publicity just now to the documents taken from Captain von Papan, recalled German military attache to the embassy at Washington. In these papers, a connection between German officials and Werner von Horn, who blew up the bridge at Vancoboro, Maine, is shown, according to British authorities.

As a result, it is expected that this will check the agitation for American protests against the British blockade of enemy ports.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—The nature of the papers taken from Captain von Papan at Folmouth, England, is a matter of no interest to me, said Count von Bernstorff, German ambassador today, in refusing to discuss the case.

Bernstorff's stand is that while he gave von Papan money, it was a matter of convenience, for which von Papan accounted to Berlin, and not to the embassy here.
