HOGS IN OREGON

THE annual report of the Portland stock yards shows that during 1915 48,614 hogs were received from all points, while during 1914 only 28,747 were received. This is an increase of nearly 20,000. Of the total number 34,405 were received from Oregon in 1914, while only 19,331 were received in 1914. This is an increase of over 13,000 in the number of hogs sent to market.

These figures are interesting because they prove that the Northwest, and Oregon in particular, is realizing the profit-making possibilities in hog-raising and is patterning after the Middle West, where hog raising is a recognized feature of the general prosperity. The country that is without live stock on the farms is never a prosperous country.

The rapid spreading of clover and corn growing are making possible profits from hog raising that were undreamed of before, for these two crops are furnishing the cheap feed that is necessary if money is to be made from hogs. Oregon farmers are realizing that hogs are money makers under proper conditions, and this realization is resulting in increased production.

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Bible and How to Read It"

Text: Acts 8:30—"Understandest thou what thou readest?" The word Bible comes to us from the Hebrew word Biblos and means book. It is called the Bible, the book, because it holds first place among books.

It is the best known book in the world. It is found in more homes, read by more people, influences more lives and brings comfort to more hearts than any other book.

The Bible is a book for thinkers. It condenses into words and sentences what man elaborates into volumes. It contains the great ideas of God. It makes known the great works and purposes of God. God's thoughts are great thoughts. God's purposes are great, world embracing. No man can master the thoughts contained in the Bible and be an ignorant man. No man can read the Bible intelligently and be a narrow minded man.

Some say, "the Bible is an antiquated book and will be superseded by a better and greater book." The Bible holds its place in the affections of the civilized world by reason of what it contains. When a greater or better book is written the Bible will, according to the law of the survival of the fittest, give place to it. But that will not be until a greater Creator appears who can create a greater world, a greater race, a greater universe than this and reveal a greater origin and destiny for man than the Bible reveals.

The Bible contains sixty-six books. If you would bind separately each book in your Bible you would have a library of sixty-six volumes written by about forty authors. Most of these writers lived hundreds of years apart, in different countries, and spoke different languages. Sixteen centuries passed from the time the first book was written and the last completed, and yet when all these sixty-one books are bound in one vol-

ume, there is our subject, one theme, the redemption of man, through Jesus the Messiah, running through all from Genesis to Revelation.

Genesis, the first book, is the book of beginnings. The first sentence challenges our thought. In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. How wonderful the thought! How it fires the imagination! What ponderous thought for the mind. God, the creator of light, life, vegetable, universal and spiritual. It does not tell how, but simply states the facts. The Bible is not a book on science, although it revealed scientific facts centuries before books on science were written.

It treats of man and his redemption—man as he was, holy and happy, man as he is marred by sin and man as he shall hereafter appear, cleansed from sin, holy and happy.

The world, teeming with life and inhabited by man is here and must be accounted for. Can you give a more reasonable and sane account of their origin, dignity and destiny of man, more glorious, more sublime than the one presented in the Bible.

Man, made in the image of God, God child—placed in the garden of delight and given dominion and finally redeemed, changed and beautified, and at last brought to enjoy God's presence in a heavenly city, whose builder and maker is God, the Bible treats of the scheme of man's redemption and a look into the contents of this most wonderful and instructive volume, claiming as it does, to contain a revelation from God to man, the child of his love, must for the want of space be deferred until later. In the mean time, as thoughtful beings, let us read the simple statements of facts as record in Genesis: 1 to 4, and reflect on the questions that concern us all. "Whence came I, what am I and whither am I tending."

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—When the snow flies, little Miss Up-to-date takes her fan in hand as she dons fur in the August sweater. She would as soon think of going to opera or ball fanless as manless. And what fans! Fine feathers certainly make fine fans and fans of a feather flock together this season as never before.

But they don't open and shut together as much as they used to, for the very newest form of feather fan is as old as the Queen of Sheba and consists of gorgeous cluster of ostrich plumes poised on a single stick of sawed ivory, amber or tortoise shell.

The most vivid hued ostrich plumes are used and bright purple, yellow, green or blue, they make an effective high light of color for any costume.

The white or black feather fans seem to cling to the open and shut model with their sticks of tortoise shell or amber usually gold inlaid or gem encrusted.

Ostrich feather fans still open and shut also, but they are not quite on the level either. Instead of forming the orthodox, symmetrical semicircle of a fan, they begin stubby and low down on one side and work gradually to their highest point on the opposite side.

Peacock feather fans are the most fancied of fantastic fans. They come either in the open and shut model or in the stick effects. The latter are

stunning and oriental on long, carved handles of gold inlaid ivory hand-carved, or jade.

Behind the many glowing eyes in the peacock's tail feathers, you can but expect a fair maid to make more eyes. Nor is it surprising that she should be much eyed.

Square fans that are not on the square since they artfully reveal tiny mirrors and even vanity cases and powder puffs on their reverse sides and lip sticks up their handles are bizarre and garishly ultra-modern with futuristic decorations and colorings.

Perhaps the most snareful of all is the one of silver gauze wired in silver to simulate a spider's web with two crystal drops of dew glistening in its meshes.

Well wielded in the skillful hands of a 1916 debutante, it should never fail to make the fly catch of the season.

SHEEP LEAVING THE LAVA BEDS

UNUSUAL AMOUNT OF SNOW AND TOO MANY ANIMALS FOR THE RANGE CAUSE EXODUS FROM LAND OF CAPTAIN JACK

According to stockmen, at least 60,000 head of sheep that were feeding in the pasture of the Modoc Lava Beds are now being fed hay on the ranches around Merrill and Tule Lake. Two feet of snow covers a big portion of the winter range.

The Lava Beds has been overstocked with sheep this year, too, it is claimed. This tract of volcanic formations and winter pasturage for animals will normally carry about 40,000 head of sheep all year. This fall and winter, twice that number were driven into the beds for wintering.
