About two years ago, the club arranged to make the library more useful to all by the removal of the small rental charge. As a result, the library has become even more popular, and for years it has been a place where thousands have spent with profit idle afternoons and evening hours. All the latest magazines are to be found in its reading room, and its shelves are filled with fine books, running the gamut from children's and fiction to reference documents. These books are partly donations from public spirited citizens, and partly purchases by the club.

In the month of December, according to the report of Miss Hawkins, the club's librarian, the library was visited by 1,983 people, and 1,075 books were circulated.

Since becoming affiliated with the National Federation, the local club has broadened its scope, until there are departments now of interest to all, each department carrying on some effective work. The departments, and those in charge of them are: Civic Department, Mrs. Louis B. Bath; Study Department, Mrs. Charles P. Stewart; Art Department, Mrs. Syd Evans; Home Economics Department, Mrs. C. V. Fisher; Philanthropic Department, Mrs. Charles Craves. Each of these departments is prepared to carry on extensive work during the coming year, work which is well worth the time of women who have not as yet become affiliated with the club.

Three afternoons are to be devoted to the subject of music by the Study Department, in charge of Mrs. Rollo C. Grosbeck, during the absence of Mrs. Stewart. "The Development of Music" will be Mrs. William C. Hurn's subject at a coming meeting, and the final musical discourse will be "The Libretto of an Opera," by Mrs. Albrecht Oehler. Three afternoons will be devoted to the study of poetry, also, the topics being "The Beginning of Poetry," "The Poet," and "Our Favorite Poems." The first of these topics will be discussed under the leadership of Miss Lucille Marshall, instructor in English at the Klamath County High School.

Instructions in various kind of needlework will be held twice a month by the Art Department, with capable women in charge to instruct novices in the art of crocheting, tatting, embroidery, etc. Mrs. Evans has given especial attention to crocheting while away, and will have some new ideas for the benefit of those desiring to ply this form of needle. The next session will be held next Friday at 2:30, and all interested women are invited to attend.

The Civic Department is also to be busy. Through its president and chairman of the Department of Home Economics, Public Health and Civics, the General Federation has set aside the week of March 4-11 as Baby Week, to be observed all over the United States. During that week the Civic Department of the local club will hold a eugenics test, to ascertain how Klamath Falls youngsters compare with those of the rest of the nation. This department has many other plans, especially for the City Beautiful, under way.

A series of at least four lectures are being arranged by Mrs. Fisher for the Home Economics Department, in which capable persons will discuss home problems with the club members. The first of these lectures will be held next Saturday afternoon, the subject of "Domestic Art" to be handled by Miss Mabel Myers, head of the Home Economics Department of the local high school.

Last, but by no means least important, is the Philanthropic Department, which, under the able leadership of Mrs. Graves, has done much to alleviate suffering and distress. Since the beginning of the club year, this department has received donations of clothing from twenty-five people, several people have made liberal cash donations, and through the commendable efforts of thirty local amateur actors who presented "The Follies,"
