**WHY NOT A MOVIE CENTER?**

SINCE the announcement a short time ago that several of the motion picture companies now operating at Los Angeles are considering leaving there will also be considerable money California, there has been a great stir in different parts of Oregon. Several towns have started active campaigns to secure the movie colonies, realizing that in addition to the tremendous advertising value of these concerns, there will also be considerable money expended by the companies' employes and by the companies for the many things entering into the pictures.

But so far, not a move on the part of Klamath Falls, which has more to offer than any other section of Oregon. It's high time to wake up and get busy.

Where, oh where, in this great state will it be possible to get the rugged canyons, the beautiful lakes, the mountains and valleys, the broad plateaus, the thousands of head of cattle and horses, feeding on real open range, the scores of real cowboys, the pine forests, the mills and factories, the rivers, creeks and brooks, the massive irrigation works, and 1,001 other features which would appeal to the film maker, all within the radius of a few miles? Nowhere else but in Klamath county. Our record for clear days will stack up as good or better than any other part of Oregon.

These motion picture concerns will make their selection of a location upon the variety of scenery and topography offered them in a comparatively small space, and upon meteorological conditions, largely. Klamath county can offer more inducements in these lines than anywhere else in the Northwest.

Isn't it time for somebody to get busy? To pass this up by default can only be termed criminal negligence on the part of the Commercial Club and others interested in Klamath's development.

HAVING broken every promise in the Baltimore platform, the democrats have gone outside the record, and their promise of a national budget is not to be redeemed. **Miners Seriously Talk of Strike in Coal Fields**

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 18.—Today, 1,600 delegates were here for the United Mine Workers of America biennial convention. The wage scale committee is meeting. All wage scale contracts for both anthracite and bituminous fields soon will expire. President John P. White for the first time refused to give out his biennial report in advance, saying it was of such importance he would not take any chances. His report is to be presented today or tomorrow.

The miners expect to demand an increase in wages of ten to twenty per cent in every organized field. There have been rumors that general coal strikes are coming. Railroads are reported to have been hoarding coal in preparation for such strikes. Officials of the mine workers today said that they could force no definite trouble if the operators proved reasonable.

The nature of the organizations' internal trouble is a secret, but it is believed to be associated with President White himself. Better working conditions will be demanded by the miners, including a request for the

general acceptance of the mine run system, in effect in Illinois and Ohio. International officials have been trying to arrange with the operators for the re-establishment of the interstate joint conference of wage scale negotiations and take the demands before a joint conference of miners and operators of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and western Pennsylvania, an agreement whereof will be a basis of negotiations in other states. The interstate conference was discontinued after the Ohio operators refused to accept the mine run proposition, which later was provided for in that state by law. This is one of the largest labor conventions in America.
