

MRS. NEUBERT IS HURT BY HORSE

ANTELOPE VALLEY WOMAN SUSTAINS SEVERELY PAINFUL INJURIES WHEN HORSE KICKS HER

Mrs. Gus Neubert, a well known Klamath county woman, is suffering from painful injuries received a couple of days ago at the Neubert ranch in Antelope valley, when a horse kicked her. The animal was in the barnyard when he attacked Mrs. Neubert, and the blow injured her jaw and cut her lip clear across her face.

Most Pathetic Incident in Commissioner Bingham's Experience

In the February Woman's Home Companion Emily Barton Reid quotes General Hiram Bingham, former police commissioner of New York city, as saying that 50,000 girls disappear annually in the United States.

"Nothing in his whole department service, General Bingham confesses, filled him with greater pity than the following single incident:

"It was dusk in New York, the hour when the streets are full of men and girls hurrying from work. The crowds streamed across Union Square toward the subway in a great flood—the whole population of an average country town passing the corner every minute. Suddenly around the corner whirled a great express wagon. The driver whistled shrilly, and the crowd, made wary by long experience, scattered in all directions. All but one girl. A single moment she hesitated, glanced both ways, dropped back a step, and then changing her mind, dashed forward in an attempt to gain the other side.

"The moment's hesitation was too much. The frightened horses rushed on. Ten minutes later her lifeless body was borne away in an ambulance to the city morgue.

"There were no marks of identification on the girl's person. The police were reduced to the necessity of publishing a description in the newspapers, hoping that relatives would come to claim the body. And in answer to that description, which was made as detailed and accurate as possible, more than 300 mothers and sisters wrote or appeared at the morgue. More than 300 women within reach of the New York papers confessed that girls whom they loved, corresponding to the description of this girl, had disappeared! Not one of them was able to identify her. She was buried after a time at the city's expense.

"Three hundred women returned to pursue their fruitless search elsewhere. What had become of the 300 girls for whom they searched?
