Year of Politics Brings Many Dates for Voters

This is to be a year of politics, so remember these dates:

April 18—Last day to register for primary election.

April 19—Last day to file petitions or declarations for nominations for county offices, district and justice of the peace.

May 19—Primary election. Polls open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.

June 4—Last day for candidates to file statements of expenditures of primaries.

September 28—Last day to file certificate of nomination by political party or assembly for county and district.

October 7—Last day to register for general election.

October 13—Last day to file certificate of nomination by individual electors for county, district and precinct.

November 7—General election. Polls open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.

November 22—Last day for candidates to file statement of expenditures.

All candidates desiring nomination by petition must file their declarations with the county clerk before circulating their petitions, and all

candidates desiring nomination without circulating petitions may do so by filing their declarations for party nomination by paying the required filing fee, which is as follows:

For all offices to be voted for in the state at large, excepting national committeemen, delegates to national party conventions and presidential electors, \$100; for representatives in congress, \$100; for all other district offices embracing more than one county, except senators and representatives in the legislature, \$50; for all candidates for county offices, including district attorney and excepting district offices within the county, \$20; for all candidates for senator and representative in the legislature, \$10; for national committeemen, delegates to national party conventions and presidential electors, \$15; for all district offices within the county, \$5; for all precinct committeemen, no fee. All candidates elected must file their acceptance with certificates of nomination.

There is no United States senator to elect this year, but the fee for entering this race is \$150. If the candidate does not want to circulate a petition.

"Uncle Jerry," Pioneer, Has Gone to His Reward

selected the site for old Fort Klamath.

At Jacksonville, Martin boarded at the boarding house conducted by Mrs. Goss. A romance ensued between the young pioneer and Elvira Goss, one of the landlady's pretty daughters, and Uncle Jerry never tired of telling of the golden days when he persuaded Elvira she should open a boarding house for one man, with himself as the star boarder. They were married in 1856, and Mrs. Martin is still living, being with her husband at his demise.

Some years later Martin became superintendent of the old Oregon & California stage company, operating the mail line between Portland and Sacramento. Millions of dollars worth of gold dust and bullion were carried over this line in those early days, when "Black Bart" and other knights of the highway were active. In 1870, Martin disposed of his interests at Jacksonville, and with his wife moved to Oakland. At the outbreak of the Modoc war he returned to Oregon, and was given the contract for transporting army supplies from the end of the Oregon & California railway in the Umpqua Valley to the Lava Beds.

Martin entered active business in Klamath Falls (then Lippville) in 1881. In partnership with the late T. C. Reames of Jacksonville, and E. R. Reames of this city, he purchased the Thatcher-Worden store, the only mercantile establishment here then, housed in the county's only brick building. The old "brick store" still stands near Link River bridge. That

was the business center of the Klamath country. Clustered around the store were the hotel, livery stable, blacksmith shop, saloon and barber shop.

Uncle Jerry retained his interest in this establishment, when it retired from business. Some time after that Martin, his son, Alex Martin Jr., and E. R. Reames organized the Klamath County Bank, the pioneer bank of the Klamath country. In 1911, the Klamath County Bank was merged with the First National Bank, and Martin became president. He has continued as president, and was here every summer, even at his advanced age, attending to business connected with the bank.

Martin was known as a man who does things throughout Southern Oregon and Northern California. Being a self made man, he realized the needs of ranchers and stockmen who might be hard pressed, and he has befriended many.

Deceased is survived by his wife and the following children: Alex Martin Jr. of Eugene; George M. Mar-
