been driven from their homes without warning, deprived of an opportunity to make provision for their most elementary wants, causing starvation, disease and untold suffering; and

"Whereas, the people of the United States of America have learned with sorrow of this terrible plight of millions of human beings and have most generously responded to the cry for help whenever such an appeal has reached them; therefore, be it

"Resolved, that, in view of the misery, wretchedness and hardships which these 9,000,000 Jews are suffering, the president of the United States be respectfully asked to designate a day on which the citizens of this country may give expression to their sympathy by contributing to the funds now being raised for the relief of the Jews in the war zones."

Whereas, the president of the United States has issued a proclamation calling upon the people of the United States to lend aid to the stricken Jewish people of the war-torn countries; and

Whereas, it seems to me eminently fit and proper that we of Oregon should bear our share in assisting so far as we may the distressed people of a race who have given to us, and to all of the people of the Union, so many worthy citizens;

Now, therefore, I, as governor of the state of Oregon, do hereby call

Sanger, editor of the Woman Rebel, a feminist publication which has created considerable interest during the past two years, was placed on trial before the United States court in New York the other day on the charge of having sent through the mails indecent literature. What she did was to air her theories

of birth control, but the busy reform societies, managed by persons who do not believe in her political theories, induced a federal grand jury to indict her. Hundreds of her friends, including many well known persons, gave her a dinner the night before she was haled to court, and many of them accompanied her to the court room.

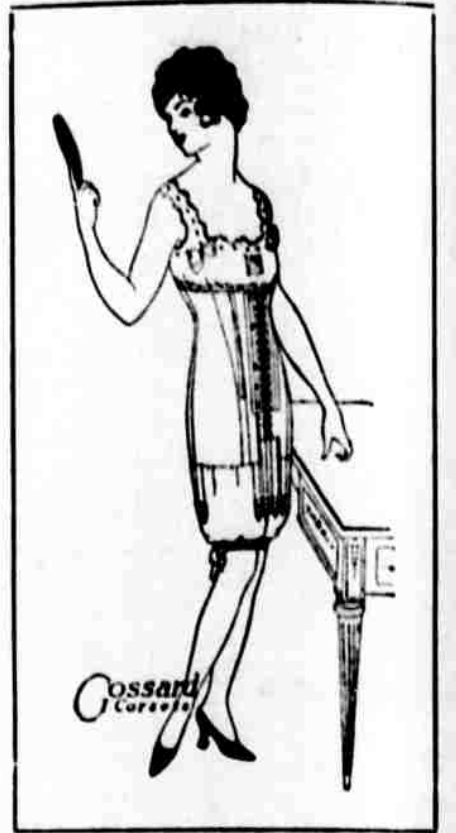

WILSON ASKS A SPEEDING MOVE

AS RESULT, CALENDARS ARE INCREASED, AND EFFORT WILL BE MADE TO PUT THROUGH IMPORTANT BILLS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25.—President Wilson has requested the leaders in both houses of congress to put on "full steam" and expedite important legislation. This seems to be bearing fruit.

The chairmen are spurring committees along, and both houses have increased calendars for consideration.

The senate committee on military affairs plans a new series of meetings shortly for the drafting of another army bill. Chairman Chamberlain believes his measure is hopelessly lost.

STEEL TRUST IS MAKING FORTUNE

FIRST DIVIDEND SINCE 1911 DECLARED TODAY, ON EARNINGS OF THE CONCERN IN THE LAST QUARTER

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—The Steel Corporation today declared a quarterly dividend of 1 1/4 per cent on common and 1 1/2 per cent on preferred stocks. This is the first dividend since 1914.

The earnings of the corporation for the last quarter were over \$51,000,000.
