SEATTLE FIRE KILLS WORKERS

RUSSIAN REFUGEES EMPLOYED IN HEMP DRYING WERE FIRE VICTIMS—THREE JUMPED TO THEIR DEATHS

SEATTLE, Jan. 26.—Trapped by a fire originating in a pile of hemp on the fourth floor, three men jumped from the fifth floor of the Walker building this morning and were killed. Three others were burned to death.

The fourth floor was occupied by a Tacoma company employing Russian refugees in hemp drying. The hemp, catching fire, burned furiously, trapping the men before the alarm sounded.

The fire was under control at 10:30. So many horses have been commandeered in Germany that oxen are being used for plowing.

INDIAN PENSION BILL UP AGAIN

such service; provided, that such officer or soldier shall have served at least thirty days in such Indian war; provided further, that nothing in this act shall be so construed as to effect a reduction in the amount of pension now received by any such officer or soldier.

"That the provisions of an act approved April 19, 1908, entitled 'An Act to increase the pension of widows, minor children, and so forth, of deceased soldiers and sailors of the late Civil War, the war with Mexico, the various Indian wars, and so forth, and to grant a pension to certain widows of the deceased soldiers and sailors of the late Civil War,' shall be held to include the widows, minor children under sixteen years of age, and helpless minors as defined by existing laws, of the officers and soldiers of the wars covered by this act."

The Hawley bill is one which should receive the support of all who know of the hardships of the early settlers. They rushed to the defense of homes and towns at a moment's notice, like the Minute Men of old, sometimes holding back savage Indians for a month or two before the troops relieved them.

The house committee on pensions, however, would grant pensions only to the men who were in service for three months or longer. This is considered as unfair to the men who rushed to the front when needed, not waiting for a mobilization, etc., and thus prevented depredations. Indian warfare was entirely different from warfare between nations, and quick action, even if only for a few weeks, was the essential feature.
