

## BURBANK DAY IN STATE SCHOOLS

BIRTHDAY OF PLANT WEAVER TO BE CELEBRATED IN EVERY SCHOOL IN OREGON ON SEVENTH OF MARCH

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 27.—Tuesday, March 7, the anniversary of the birth of Luther Burbank, will be observed with exercises in the public schools of the state, according to an announcement made by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill today.

"It seems particularly fitting in connection with our agricultural and industrial club work in the public schools, that we should have a Burbank day, and with proper preparation and exercises familiarize the boys and girls with the man who has accomplished so much for human progress," said the superintendent in making the announcement. "When farm boys learn that soil chemistry, horticulture, stock breeding and similar studies require as much brain activity as do electricity, law and medicine, and that Burbank is classed with such men as Edison, and has an income greater than most lawyers, they will hesitate before going to the cities to become finkies for corporations whose managers will consider them only as so much property."
