## Ask Klamath Poultrymen to Join New Association

The following from R. B. Peebles of Medford, secretary of the Southern Oregon Poultry Association, was received by the Klamath Commercial Club:

Dear Sir—The Southern Oregon Poultry Association has just been formed within the past month, with the object of furthering the interests of poultry culture. As you know, this industry is in a generally neglected condition in the southern part of this state, and yet there is nowhere a finer natural poultry country, climate, etc. There is room here for a second Poultryama. It is our conviction that, by means of organization and an annual exhibition, meetings, lectures, extension work of the A. O. C., etc., that a good deal can be done to successfully arouse interest in the opportunities for poultry culture on a large

scale in the three counties of Jackson, Klamath and Josephine.

We have decided to hold a show from February 9th to 12th, inclusive, with competition limited to the three counties named above. Outside stock will be admitted in a non-competitive class for our instruction. Chickens, turkeys, pigeons, ducks, geese, hares and rabbits will be admitted to the show, and will be eligible for competition for the premiums to be offered.

A premium list is being prepared, and we shall be pleased to forward you a copy and entry blanks as soon as same are finally arranged. We will welcome your hearty co-operation and trust that there may be many exhibits from your section. All stock will be carefully looked after by experienced poultry men, and every consideration will be shown to exhibitors from a distance.

There is no entry fee this year. We should be pleased to receive application from any who care to join us for membership in our association, for which there is no fee this year. Voluntary donations toward our general and exhibition expenses will be received with thanks, however.

Should you later on decide to form a similar association in your county and to hold an annual exhibition, we would be very glad, indeed, and would co-operate with you in any way possible. A list of possible exhibitors from your section and a list of possible members would be much appreciated.

In response Secretary Fred E. Fleet has sent the following:  
Your favor of January 24th, regarding a poultry show to be held by your association in Medford, February 9th to 12th, is at hand.

In reply, beg to advise that this office will be pleased to co-operate with you in any way possible to make this show a success, and to stimulate the growing of a better grade of poultry throughout the southern part of the state.

I had the pleasure a few days since of meeting C. P. Carpenter of your city, and giving him a list of those in the neighborhood that might send exhibits. Will also give the matter further publicity in the papers, so that all those interested may have a chance to compete.

If you will send entry blanks, etc., to this office, as you suggest, we will attempt to distribute them from this point.
