Notice of Drainage District Bond Election

Notice is hereby given that at a meeting of the board of directors of the Klamath Drainage District of Klamath county, Oregon, held at the office of said board on the 15th day of January, A. D. 1916, a resolution was adopted calling a special election, at which shall be submitted to the electors of said district the question whether or not bonds of said district in the

amount of \$100,000.00 shall be authorized, and in pursuance of such resolution a special election is hereby called to be held on the 19th day of February, A. D. 1916, at which election there will be submitted to the electors of said district the question of creating a bonded debt in the sum of \$100,000.00, for the purpose of building drainage and reclamation works and a system of dikes, canals and ditches for the reclamation of the lands within the boundary of said drainage district, the vote to be by ballot, upon which shall be the words, "Bonds—Yes" and the words, "Bonds—No." Polls to be opened at 2 o'clock p. m., and to remain open until 5 o'clock p. m. of said day. The polling place is designated to be at the office of the board of directors at No. 712 Main street, in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon.
